MINUTES CITY OF DENTON DENTON PUBLIC LIBRARY BOARD

Emily Fowler Central Library - November 10, 2025

After determining that a quorum was present, the Denton Public Library Board convened on Monday, November 10, at 5:30 p.m. The meeting was held at the Emily Fowler Central Library at 502 Oakland St., Denton, Texas.

PRESENT: Jean Greenlaw, Rebecca Fridley, Ellen Sullivan, Kerol Harrod, Patricia Peters, and Kathryn Pole

1. PRESENTATION FROM MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC

None.

2. ITEMS FOR CONSIDERATION

A. LB25-074 Consider approval of the minutes of October 13, 2025.

The Board accepted and approved the minutes. Rebecca Fridley motioned, Kathryn Pole seconded, all in favor.

B. LB25-070 The Board received an informational report regarding the Municipal Archive.

Archivist Matt Davis will provide an overview of the Municipal Archive located at the Emily Fowler Central Library.

The Municipal Archive was created in 2018 and houses unique materials from the City of Denton and items of local historical significance. The Municipal Archive processes and preserves historical documents and ephemera, organizes them, provides finding aids, and makes most items available for public access as in library use. Municipal Archive collections can be found through the Municipal Archive site that is available on the library's online catalog or https://denton.lyrasistechnology.org/.

Collection examples include:

 Parks and Recreation Department cemetery records, administrative records, visual media, audio media, printed materials, scrapbooks, and subject files for Water Works Park and the Denton Community Network.

- KDTN Channel 2 collection of internal documents and litigation documents related to licensing and construction permit agreements.
- Denton Centennial Collection of scrapbooks, memorabilia, printed materials, Centennial Group membership lists, photographs, and film.
- League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC), Denton Council 4366 collection of organizational files, histories, visual media, audio media, and subject files.

C. LB25-068

The Board received an informational report regarding the Friends of the Denton Public Libraries.

Library staff presented funding requests to the Friends Executive Board at the October 9, 2025, meeting. The Board approved 2025 additional funding requests for the special \$25,000 donation made to the Friends and an additional \$5,000 due to their successful fundraising this year. The 2026 funding request was submitted and will be voted on at their January 8, 2026, meeting.

The Friends are preparing for their November 8 Big Book Sale. They have purchased new book bags with their new logo. They are working on several fundraising efforts for 2026. The Board also approved the 2026 meetings and book sale schedule.

D. LB25-069

The Board received an informational report regarding the Emily Fowler Library Foundation.

The Foundation currently has a \$100,000 CD that will come to maturity in April 2026. The Foundation checking account has a balance of \$9,091.51 as of the latest statement in May 2025. The Foundation's goal is to focus on bequests or planned giving donations that can be used for large scale Library initiatives or capital projects.

Foundation Trustees met on Tuesday, November 4, 2025, to discuss proposed bylaws, use of the \$100,000 CD that comes to maturity in April 2026, and banking options to maximize interest on accounts. The funds in the \$100,000 are restricted for use to support Special Collections.

Jean Greenlaw motioned, Patricia Peters seconded, all in favor.

F. LB25-072

The Board received a report and held a discussion regarding an appeal request for a library suspension:

Per the Library Rules of Conduct a patron issued a library suspension may appeal their suspension by submitting a letter of appeal. The appeal will be brought to the Library Board for discussion, and the Board will provide a recommendation to the Director of Libraries

A library suspension of one year was issued to a library patron due to an incident on August 24, 2025. The patron left before the suspension could be given. The patron returned on October 23, 2025, and was provided with the suspension form. The appeal letter was submitted and received by Library Administration on October 30, 2025.

The Library seeks a recommendation from the Library Board regarding the appeal whether to uphold the suspension, reduce the suspension, or waive the suspension. The summary of documentation provided to Library Board members is attached to the minutes.

After some discussion, the Library Board brought forward a vote to reduce the suspension to 6 months allowing access to online resources during the remainder of the suspension. Rebecca Fridley motioned, Ellen Sullivan seconded, 4 in favor, 2 against. Suspension reduction passes.

G. LB25-073

The Board received a report and held a discussion regarding:

2026 Strategic Plan Action Items - Library staff are identifying items for 2026 strategic plan action items. Several current strategic plan action items are multi-year and will continue in 2026. No more than eight new items could be added in the new year. A final list of all 2026 strategic plan action items will be presented to the Library Board at the December 8, 2025 meeting. Some of the new action items proposed and being reviewed by staff are:

- Strategic assessment of library operations
- Investigate budget account options for revenue funds for supplies or retail that is sold at the library and a furniture and equipment replacement account
- Develop a Library grant process to accompany the City's grant process
- Assess and refresh Discovery Kits
- Develop a system for management and access of system-wide equipment and resources (staff equipment or program equipment

housed at one branch that could be used at other branches for specific events or projects)

- Develop a library technology plan
- Develop a structure, clean out, and organize the department shared drive and Teams channels

Material Vendor Impacts - The largest library book vendor, Baker & Taylor, will cease operations by January 2026. Denton Public Library has spent the last 18 months diversifying material vendors and has multiple print vendors for library materials. In addition to print materials, the library also used Baker & Taylor's BTCat cataloging software utility and Content Café and FirstLook book cover images and reviews in the online library catalog. Alternative software options have been identified, and the library is in the procurement process to replace those products.

South Branch 30th Anniversary - South Branch will be celebrating its 30th anniversary in 2026. A celebration event is being planned for the spring of 2026. Board members are invited to participate but must RSVP two weeks prior to the event.

Parent Guide - Library staff are developing a parent guide to help families best curate their child's experience at the library. It includes information about library collections and the ages and reading levels they target, information about how parents can actively engage in selecting the best book for their child, and resources for parents to learn more about titles and find reviews and summaries. The parent guide is expected to be available on the library website before the end of 2025.

Staff issued the suspension form relating to the 8/24/25 incident and reminded her that a Criminal Trespass Warning was in effect. Suspension is for 8/24/25-8/23/26, based on the date of the incident. Staff provided appeal information for the library suspension and information regarding how to find appeal information for the Criminal Trespass Warning.

BACKGROUND

Catalog Librarian Shannon Young will provide an overview of the purpose and processes for Cataloging.

Cataloging is the process of creating metadata records for information resources provided by the library. It involves building a record that provides information such as the name of the author or creator of an item, the title, publisher information, a physical description of the item, and subject terms that describe the resource and subjects it covers. The records produced by catalog librarians are how libraries organize information in order to make the resources they provide easily accessible to the public.







INCLEMENT WEATHER OPERATING POLICY

Reviewed by the Library Management Team, December 7, 2023

All instructions regarding the closing of City offices or facilities will be issued by the City Manager. The Library will then follow the Library Emergency Contact Protocol: the Director of Libraries will notify library division managers, central administrative staff, and Facilities of any closing. Managers will then notify Assistant Branch Managers, Circulation Supervisors, and their direct report staff members. Assistant Branch Managers and Circulation Supervisors will notify their direct report staff members. Assigned staff will then notify seasonal temporary employees, interns, volunteers, and community service participants. (See Library Emergency Contact Protocol chart.)

The procedure for reporting absence due to inclement weather conditions is the same as for any other absence.

Staff who are able to work remotely may be assigned remote work during inclement weather.

Library staff may be assigned to assist with other City departments or participate in City community assistance efforts during inclement weather.

If library facilities are open during inclement weather:

Libraries should not open to the public unless there are at least two people available for public service. One of the two should be a <code>4L</code> ibrarian or Circulation Supervisor. Efforts to secure an additional two employees by noon should be made. If additional staff are not available by noon, staff should contact the library director, who will then contact the City Manager's Office.

If inclement weather and weather conditions cause non-exempt employees to arrive later or leave earlier than their assigned work hour, the employee will be allowed to make up the time within the same **work week**.

If weather conditions cause employees to be absent, the supervisor may account for their absence by use of one of the following three methods:

- Allow the non-exempt employee to make up the lost time within the **work** week to ensure compliance with FLSA.
- ➤ If the employee has no accrued time, allowing the employee to use approved leave WITHOUT pay.

➤ Allow the employee to use accumulated vacation time at the discretion of the supervisor.

If library facilities are closed during inclement weather:

In the event City offices are closed by the City Manager due to inclement weather, employees will refer to City of Denton Inclement Weather Policy 110.03.

EXHIBIT OPERATING POLICY

Approved by the Denton Public Library Board, September 2, 2004 Library Board approved revision, January 8, 2024

Exhibit space is available to groups and individuals on an equitable basis Groups or individuals wishing to exhibit cohesive collections of items or art that support the library's mission shall make a request to the library branch exhibit coordinator. Requests must be submitted at least one month in advance of desired dates of exhibition.

The library reserves the right to limit the number of exhibits in each location at one time. Requests for exhibition dates and times are scheduled on a first-come, first-served basis. First priority is given to Library and City of Denton exhibits. Secondary priority is given to other government agency exhibits. Third priority is given to local non-profit organizations. The display of any items does not imply advocacy or endorsement by the library or the City of Denton.

The Library will consider a wide range of expression in deciding on potential exhibitors. However, in deciding the suitability of any exhibit, the Library is mindful that the exhibit area is used by all segments of the community and viewed by all age groups. Exhibits may not include defaming or obscene materials as defined by the U.S. Supreme Court or material which would lead to breach of peace or which advocates the violation of State criminal laws.

The Library will use the following criteria for selection:

- Community needs and interest
- Availability of display place
- Historical or educational significance
- Connection to other community or national programs, exhibitions, or events
- Relation to library collections, resources, exhibits, and programs
- Ease of installation
- subject, technique and style suitable for intended audience
- artistic expression
- appropriateness to special events, anniversaries, holidays, etc.
- historical or regional relevance
- relation to other events or exhibits in the community
- ease of installation
- representation of an influential movement, genre, trend or national culture
- significance of the contributor
- attention of viewers and the public

The exhibit space is not to be used for <u>advancing a political cause</u>, advertising for commercial enterprises, <u>religious in nature</u>, <u>or promoting hate speech or political candidates</u>s.

All exhibited items must fit in the assigned space. Exhibit spaces may include enclosed display cabinets, wall spaces, or open areas for freestanding displays.

The Branch Manager library branch exhibit coordinator must approve all exhibits and reserves the right to prohibit any person or group from displaying materials.

By exhibiting material, the individual/group grants permission for Denton Public Library and the City of Denton to photograph any displayed work for publicity purposes unless otherwise stated in writing. Denton Public Library may publicize exhibits using a variety of print and electronic platforms.

BOOKING

Groups wishing to display their items must complete an Exhibit Loan Agreement Form. This form does not guarantee placement of an exhibit.

The library reserves the right to remove an exhibit without prior notice.

Reservations will be revoked if the Library determines in its sole discretion the exhibit is not in compliance with this policy and any expenses incurred by a group will be that group's responsibility.

The Library reserves the right to change, reschedule or cancel exhibits when necessary.

SETTING UP AND REMOVAL

Exhibitors must arrange time(s) for hanging exhibits through the Library. The work must be prepared for hanging or display. The Library does not provide storage space. No modification of the library facility is permitted for the installation of an exhibit. No tape or stickers shall be affixed to the walls.

If the exhibit is not claimed within a two-week time period after the closing date of said exhibit, and after notification to the exhibitor in writing, the Library is not responsible for the exhibit and may dispose of the items as it sees fit.

LIABILITY

The Library does not carry insurance on materials loaned to the Library for exhibit. The Library assumes no responsibility for the preservation, protection, or possible damage or theft of any item exhibited. All items placed in the library for exhibit are so placed at the owner's risk.

PUBLICITY

The Library provides very limited publicity. Information about exhibits and receptions may be included in the library's marketing, but it is not guaranteed. Exhibitors are welcome to do any other desired publicity on their own.

SALES

The library will not act as the exhibitor's agent in the sale of his or her work.

The views in the works exhibited are those of the exhibitor and are not necessarily those of the Library.

GIFT OPERATING POLICY

Approved by Denton Library Board September 6, 2001 Library Board approved revision, January 8, 2024

POLICY STATEMENT: The Denton Public Library welcomes gifts of new and used books, audio recordings, CDs and DVDsmonetary donations and gifts of new or gently used items to support library operations. Items may be added to the collection in accordance with the collection development policy of the Library based on need and space limitations.

BOOK DONATIONS: Book Donations are accepted during regular library hours at the North Branch Library, 20303020 N. Locust St. Once donated, items become the property of Denton Public Library. Donated items that are not added to the collectionn books may be sold by the Friends of the Denton Public Libraries in their book sale, given to local non-profit agencies, used at library events, recycled or discarded. Items will not be returned to the donor and the library will not accept any item that is not an outright gift. The library reserves the right to decide when a gift added to the collection must be withdrawn.

According to the Denton Public Library Collection Policy, the following items are not added to the collection or therefore accepted as donations. The following items are not accepted as donations:

- Textbooks
- Back Issues of Magazines and Newspapers
- Encyclopedias
- Audiovisual Materials (DVDs, CDs, Cassettes, Video Tapes, etc.)
- Items or formats not part of the DPL Collection Development Policy

While donations of materials are appreciated, the staff costs and space available to sort and evaluate these donations is also an important consideration. Because of this, the library limits the amount of material accepted to two boxes not to exceed 15x14x20 or two grocery bags per household per day.

ITEM DONATIONS: Donated items that can be used to support library operations must comply with the City of Denton Ethics Policy 10.00. With approval of the Branch Manager, donated items that can be used to support library operations may be accepted during regular library hours at the intended library location. Once donated, items become the property of Denton Public Library. Items will not be returned to the donor and the library will not accept any item that is not an outright gift. The library reserves the right to refuse any donation for any reason.

A donation receipt form willcan be provided to any customer making a donation of materials to the Denton Public Library. Library staff is prohibited by law from appraising gifts for tax deduction purposes. If items are being donated to obtain a tax benefit, it is the donor's responsibility to establish fair market value or obtain expert assistance in establishing any value.

While donations of materials are appreciated, the staff costs and space available to sort and evaluate these donations is also an important consideration. Because of this, the library limits the amount of material accepted to two boxes not to exceed 15x14x20 or two grocery bags per household per day.

MONETARY GIFTS: Outright monetary gifts are welcome and can be made to the Denton Public Library or Emily Fowler Library Foundation Fund. Monetary donations to the Denton Public Library may be made at any library branch.

MEMORIALS/HONORARIUMS/DESIGNATED GIVING: Monetary donations are welcome for the purchase of memorials and honorariums, or to support specific library programs. New materials destined for memorials and honorariums will be purchased by the Technical Services Department through the Library Donation Fund. Suggestions for subject areas or other areas of interest are welcome and will be followed to the extent possible.

Books, videos, and other materials purchased with donor contributions will be identified with special donor plates whenever possible. The donor must provide contact information if the family/recipient is to be notified of the memorial or honorary donation.

Acceptance of donations of equipment, artifacts, works of art, collections, etc. may be considered based on the suitability to the purposes and needs of the library, laws and regulations that govern the ownership of the gift, and the library's ability to cover insurance and maintenance costs associated with the donation. Acceptance of donations with a value of less than \$100 will be determined by a Branch Manager. With approval by the Library Director, donations of equipment, artifacts, works of art, collection, etc., with a value of \$100 or more will be brought before City Council for acceptance.

ACCEPTANCE OF SPECIAL COLLECTIONS MATERIALS: Special Collections accepts materials through gift, bequest, transferal, and through purchase. All materials should have a clear chain of custody (provenance) and the donor or seller must have legal title to those materials. Donated items will be accepted when accompanied by a Deed of Gift and inventory of items at the time of donation. Every attempt should be made to have the items and Deed of Gift submitted together, but should this not be possible, an inventory will be compiled which along with a Deed of Gift sent to donor to be returned to the library. Any and all restrictions or special conditions are noted in the Deed of Gift. If an item is considered a valuable addition to the collection but the owner does not wish to part with it, library staff will consider creating a copy so that the original can remain with the owner. It should be noted that Special Collections does not make monetary appraisals of donated materials. All donors are encouraged to have their collections

appraised by a knowledgeable appraiser. Donors are also encouraged to consult IRS tax law to determine if their gift is tax deductible.
