After determining that a quorum was present, the Community Services Advisory Committee of the City of Denton, Texas convened in a Special Called Meeting on Friday, January 9, 2026, at 12:00 p.m. in Training Rooms 1 and 2 at the Development Services Center, 401 N. Elm Street, Denton, Texas.

Called to order at 12:06 p.m. by Chair Dale Tampke with four members present.

1. ITEMS FOR INDIVIDUAL CONSIDERATION

A. CSAC 25-038 – Consider approval of minutes of October 10, 2025.

Chair Dale Tampke requested a motion to approve the minutes as listed.

Member Tracey Long moved to approve the minutes. Member Kamyon Conner seconded the motion. The motion carried.

B. CSAC 25-039 – Receive a report and hold a discussion regarding the committee's anticipated activities for the 2026-2027 program year.

Staff provided a presentation around anticipated activities and responsibilities of the committee. No questions from members.

C. CSAC 25-040 – Consider approval of the Community Services Advisory Committee's 2026 meeting schedule.

One member asked about the city's new work schedule and the effect that it would have on the current meeting schedule. Staff explained that while the city's business hours have changed, the meetings can occur anytime during business hours, so it won't have an effect if the committee chooses to continue to meet at 12 p.m. Staff explained that on the second page of the agenda item there are two proposed schedules and one that can be determined by the committee. Staff explained that the reason for the second proposal is due to historical knowledge of cancelled meetings due to no quorum while also making note that scheduled meetings may be cancelled if there are no items to discuss for that month. After careful deliberation the committee proposed to meet on the following days for 2026.

Chair Dale Tampke requested a motion to approve the 2026 schedule. Tracey Long proposed the 2026 schedule discussed be approved. Kamga Siewe seconded the motion.

D. CSAC 25-041 – Receive a report regarding the status of the substantial amendment for HOME Investment Partnership (HOME) and HOME Investment Partnership American Rescue Plan (HOME-ARP) funds.

Staff provided an update to the committee regarding the substantial amendment. One member asked if there was anticipation that HUD would approve the amendment. Staff responded that there is anticipation that HUD will approve the amendment, but unsure of when they will approve since the government shutdown impacted usual business.

E. CSAC 25-042 Receive a report and hold a discussion regarding the closeout of the 2024-2025 Community Development Grant program year with agency expenditures and performance measures.

Staff provided an overview of the expenditure and performance measures for Housing and Public Facility Projects and Human Services. Staff gave an update on Habitat for Humanity, Habitat Village project that is up and running and should expend all funds by the end of the fiscal year. The Homebuyer Assistance program was closed out, assisting only 4 households due to no available homes to help. Residual funds from the Homebuyer Assistance Program will be reallocated to the Minor Repair Program.

Denia Park project was completed in October but will be reported in the 25/26 fiscal year. For the Human Services project, staff explained that most of the agencies expended their award amount and met client goals. North Texas Solutions did not meet the expenditures and client goals due to the agency closing in April 2025.

Staff explained that most agencies are either excellent or good reporters, except for one being inadequate with 7 late reports. Staff explained that moving forward staff are documenting the amount of time provided for technical assistance to agencies and will bring that information to the committee each month in addition to the monthly reporting. One member asked if the

outcomes are aggregated across all agencies and staff response was it is an aggregate across all agencies based on the common outcome the agency measured. It was noted that in the current year, staff worked with organizations to collect accurate outcomes for the year as the previous year was skewed.

F. CSAC 25-043 Receive a report regarding changes to federal Continuum of Care homelessness funding.

Staff provided information regarding changes to the Continuum of Care (CoC) funding. It was noted that the President of the United States provided direction regarding homelessness approach. HUD issued a Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) for CoC's but was later pulled by the courts due to lawsuit. There are three major changes regarding CoC funding; the types of things the federal government wants to fund, transitional housing which historically was removed as a type of housing program utilized for homelessness, and more collaborations with law enforcement agencies. HUD wants to move towards 70% competitive process for programs, while 30% is designed for chronically homeless individuals and families called Permanent Supportive Housing. Staff explained to the committee that the City of Denton is a part of the Balance of State CoC, which the Balance of State submits a CoC application to HUD on behalf of all its partners. On January 9, 2026, HUD issued a notice stating they would comply with the court order that renewals would be processed but not necessarily funded. Staff are still analyzing the information for interpretation. One member asked if HUD would change eligible activities and staff noted that while HUD could drive changes regarding eligible activities, they would have to go through a series of regulatory changes first to proceed.

In concluding items, a member asked if the survey could be sent again to them as they never received it via email, so that they can inform others to complete the survey.

BACKGROUND

The Community Services Advisory Committee (CSAC) will hold a discussion, make nominations, and elect a Chair and Vice Chair of the committee based on the rules and procedures outlined by City Council and the City Secretary's Office (Handbook for Boards, Commissions, and Council Committees, April 2021). Procedures for the election of officers for appointed boards are established to ensure consistency with the City Council's goals and policies in making board appointments. Election of officers for City of Denton council-appointed boards will be as follows:

- The Chair and Vice-Chair will be elected by voting board members.
- Election of officers shall be annually and occur in January or February. For those boards not meeting regularly, the election shall be held during the first board meeting of the calendar year. If, for any reason, the chair or vice-chair vacates their seat, a special election shall be held to fill the unexpired term. A temporary chair may be selected by the board pursuant to Roberts Rules of Order. The staff liaison, designated by the City Manager, shall serve as the official secretary to the board or commission to ensure records are maintained in accordance with requirements of the City Secretary's office.

STRATEGIC ALIGNMENT

This action supports Key Focus Area: Foster Economic Opportunity and Affordability.

BACKGROUND

The Community Services Advisory Committee (CSAC) provides a critical role in funding recommendations for applicants applying for the Community Development Grant Program. For the year 2025-2026, a total of \$5,132,526 of Community Development Grant Program funds were awarded to twenty-two agencies. These agencies provide a broad range of services that align with the City's 2023-2027 Consolidated Plan (ConPlan) and address critical community needs.

Throughout the City's fiscal year (October 1 through September 30), grant-funded agencies are required to submit documentation of eligible expenditures for reimbursement along with performance measures that demonstrate the impact and effectiveness of services provided to Denton residents. Performance data submitted by agencies is used to monitor compliance, measure outcomes, and inform future funding decisions.

The quarterly (October- December) expenditures and performance report for Community Development Grant Programs is provided for committee review and discussion.

Receive a report regarding the status of the substantial amendment for HOME Investment Partnership (HOME) and HOME Investment Partnership Program American Rescue Plan (HOME-ARP) funds.

STRATEGIC ALIGNMENT This action supports Key Focus Area: Foster Economic Opportunity and Affordability.

BACKGROUND

During the [July meeting \(linked\)](#), the Community Services Advisory Committee (CSAC) provided direction to allocate unprogrammed HOME Investment Partnership (HOME) funds for Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) to supplement HOME Investment Partnership Program American Rescue Plan (HOME-ARP) funds and extend the term of the program past April 2026. Staff have initiated the process to complete the substantial amendments to allocate the unprogrammed HOME funds to the TBRA program.

An ad for the Substantial Amendment was posted in the Denton Record Chronicle on Sunday, August 31, 2025, providing a summary of the amendments and notice of a 30-day comment period from September 1 through 30. A summary of the amendment was also posted on the Community Development webpage and sent via email to community members, previous housing program clients, committee members, local churches, participating lenders and realtors, neighborhood associations, and social services agencies. Two comments were received during the comment period.

The City of Denton currently has TBRA agreements with Our Daily Bread and Giving Grace, Inc. The agreement will terminate on April 30, 2026. Our Daily Bread elected to terminate the TBRA agreement on April 30, 2026, without amendment. Giving Grace, Inc. elected to enter into a new agreement that includes the balance of HOME-ARP funds and the unprogrammed HOME funds. Below is a timeline for the new TBRA agreement with Giving Grace.

DISCUSSION

2026-27 Community Development Funding Survey

An annual survey is conducted to gather resident feedback regarding community priorities for housing and community development needs. The CSAC committee will utilize this feedback to evaluate and recommend organizations for funding through the Community Development Grant Program. In October 2025, the Community Services Department conducted a Funding Priority Survey via Survey Methods for the 2026-2027 Funding Program Year. Community members were notified of the survey via email, social media, the City's website, and the Denton Record Chronicle. There were 313 responses to the survey, summarized in Exhibit 2.

2026-27 Community Development Grant Program Applications

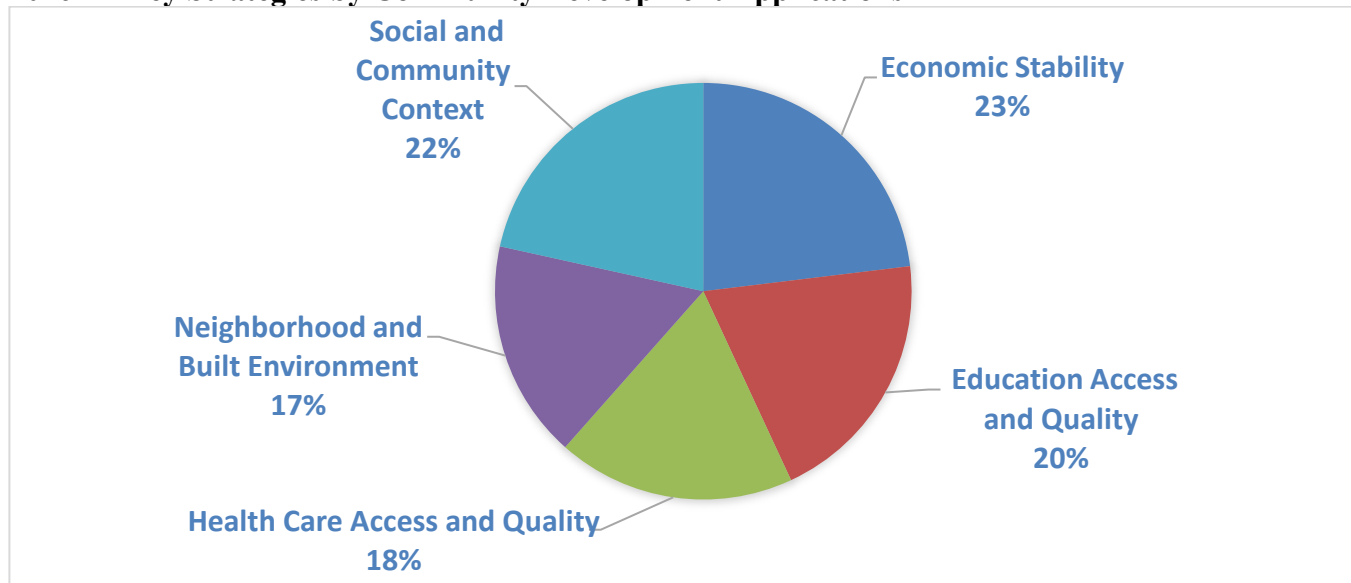
The 2026-27 Community Development Grant Program application for Housing Projects, Public Facilities, and Human Services Grant applications were released on November 24, 2025. The applications closed on January 16, 2026. Information regarding the grant application and training dates was sent to local nonprofit organizations, City departments, interested parties, and posted on social media. Exhibit 3 summarizes the applications submitted.

A total of twenty-eight (28) applications were received by the due date, totaling \$3,001,166. Human Services requests totaled \$1,145,936 for twenty (20) applications, and the total funding available for these applications is estimated to be \$535,355. Housing Project requests totaled \$1,205,000 for five (5) applications, and Public Facility requests totaled \$650,230 for three (3) applications, and the total funding available for these applications is estimated to be \$1,637,440.

City's Key Strategies by Agencies

One of the evaluation criteria for the 2026-2027 Community Development Grant Program application is meeting one of the five City's key strategies. These strategies are tools to help the city assess and prioritize community well-being more comprehensively. Exhibit 4 shows the aggregate based on applicants' selection of key strategies. Applicants could select more than one strategy addressed by their program.

2026-27 Key Strategies by Community Development Applications



Staff Review of Applications for Eligibility

Based on committee direction, staff reviewed applications for committee consideration based on the minimum evaluation criteria outlined below:

- Meet one of the three National Objectives
- Meet one of the city's key strategies
- Eligible activity for funding
- Agency is a 501 © 3 operating for at least two (2) years in the City of Denton or service City of Denton residents for at least two years
- Amount requested falls within the allowed range
- Agency attended funding application training or requested presentation via email
- Housing and Public Facilities Projects were shovel-ready and completed a pre-application meeting
- Housing and Public Facilities Projects will be completed within 1 to 2 years from October 2026

All applications met basic eligibility requirements.

2027-28 Application Notes

City Staff made several observations about this year's grant application that can be used to improve our application in future years, which are outlined below. Staff will be revising the application for next year to simplify the application and improve application training.

1. Simplify the language on questions as some agencies were confused with the wording of the application.
2. Some agencies did not provide the minimum or maximum proposed outcomes.
3. Some applications had inconsistent information on the amount of request and beneficiary information throughout the application.

Neighborly Training

Staff will provide committee members with training on accessing Neighborly Software, reviewing and scoring applications, and submitting funding recommendations. The Community Services Advisory Committee will review and score the applications using the approved scoring rubric (Exhibit 5) by March 20, 2026. The applications are scored based on the categories below:

- Experience and Organizational Capacity
- Community Need and Impact

- Financial Capacity

Committee members are requested to submit questions regarding applicant proposals by **March 6, 2026**, and staff will make every effort to get responses by the scoring deadline.

Exhibit 6 includes a funding recommendation calculator to assist committee members when evaluating applications. The results from the funding calculator will be presented to the committee at the April Committee meeting.

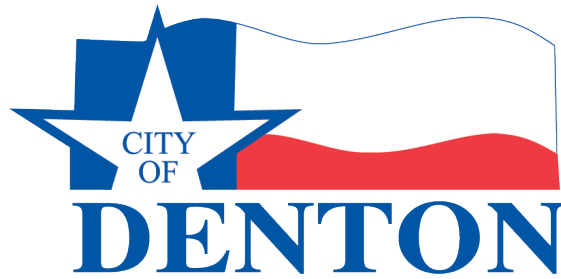

2026-2027 City of Denton Community Development Funding Priority Survey Results



2026-2027 Community Development Funding Priority Survey Overview

Each year, the City of Denton receives federal funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for community development, housing, and public services for low and moderate-income persons. The City of Denton conducts an annual survey to gather resident feedback regarding community priorities for housing and community development needs. The Community Services Advisory Committee utilizes this feedback to evaluate and recommend organizations for funding through the City of Denton's Community Development Grant Program.

In October 2025 the Community Services Department conducted a 14- question Funding Priority Survey via Survey Methods for the 2026-2027 Funding Program Year. Community members were notified of the survey via email, social media, the City's website, and the Denton Record Chronicle. There were 313 responses to the survey.

Respondents were asked to rank the needs in program areas identified in the City's 2023-2027 Consolidated Plan for Housing and Community Development: Affordable Housing, Homelessness, Public Services, Public Facilities in order of priority, with 1 being the highest priority or most important. This year the survey also gathered feedback on how residents prefer to receive feedback on community development activities, and common ways to seek or refer neighbors to local resources.

The priorities for each program area were captured using 3 metrics; average ranking, the raw number and the percentage in which the need was selected as a top 3 of priority by respondents. For example, in question one; "Affordable Housing: Please rank the following Affordable Housing needs in the City of Denton in order of priority, with 1 being the highest priority."; "Repair homes for low-income homeowners" received an average ranking of 2.61 and was selected as a top 3 priority by 252 out of 310 respondents or 81.29%, essentially making it the top priority related to affordable housing. This was followed by "Provide housing for groups with limited access to resources" with a 2.61 Ranking Average and top 3 selections by 204 out of 310 respondents or 65.80% and "Help residents buy their first home" with a 2.86 Ranking Average and top 3 selections by 184 out of 310 respondents or 59.35%, representing the second and third priorities related to affordable housing.

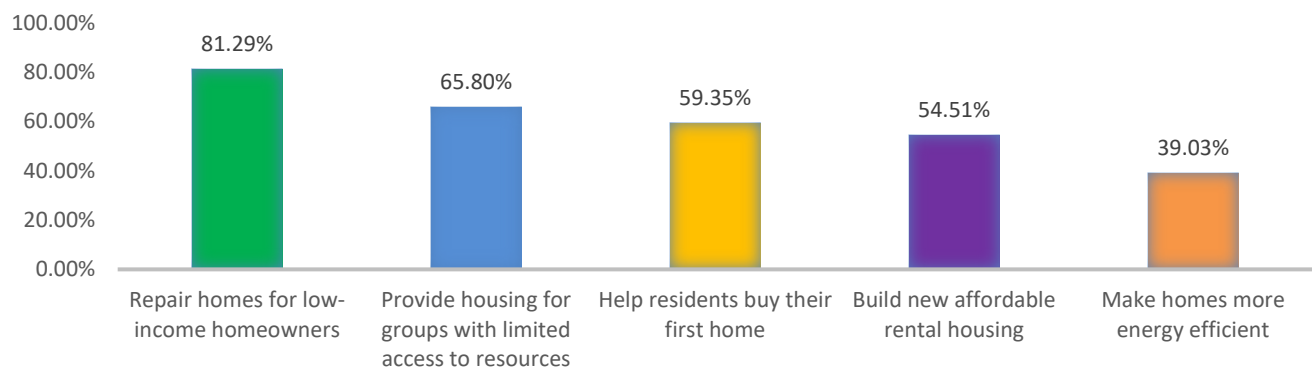

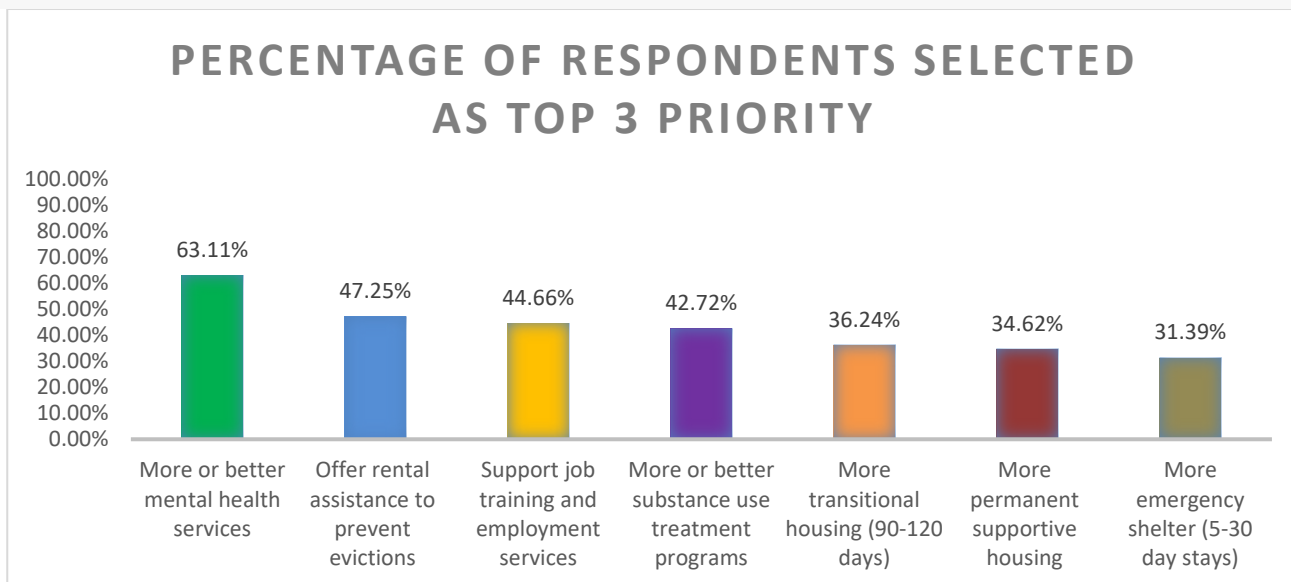
PERCENTAGE OF RESPONDENTS SELECTED AS TOP 3 PRIORITY

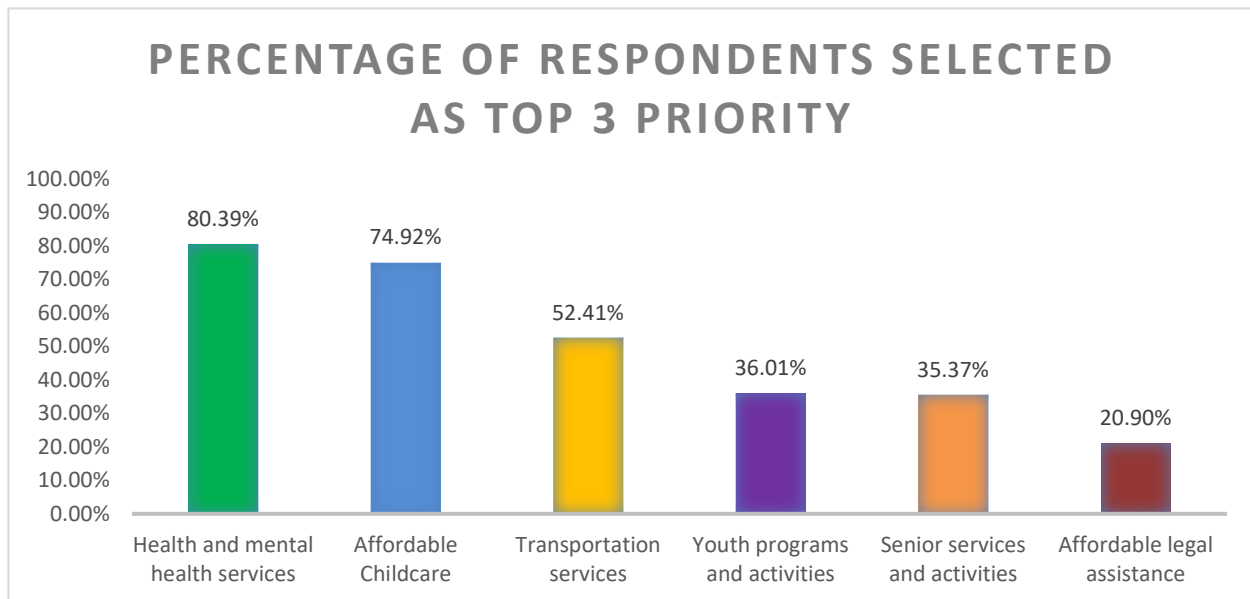

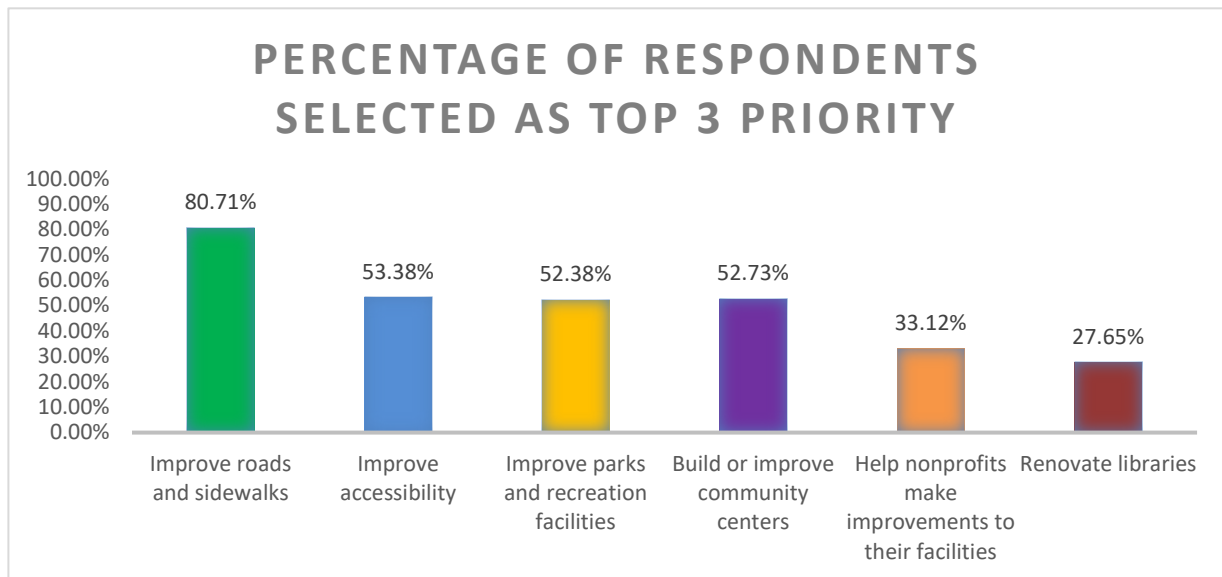

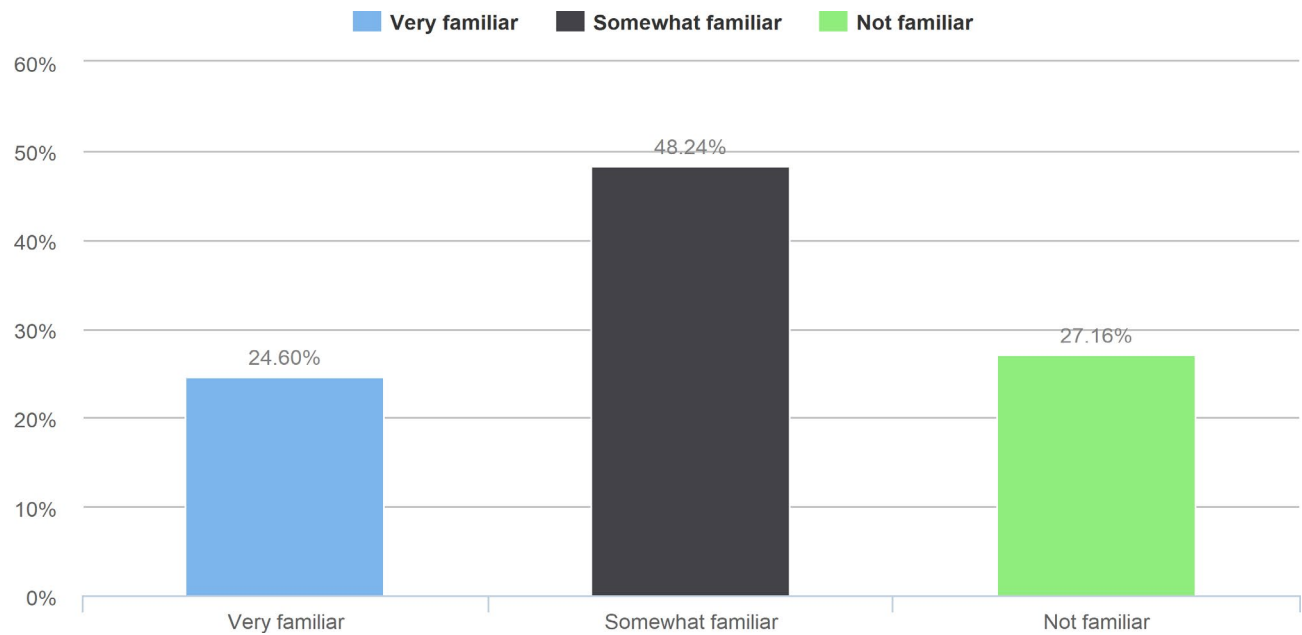

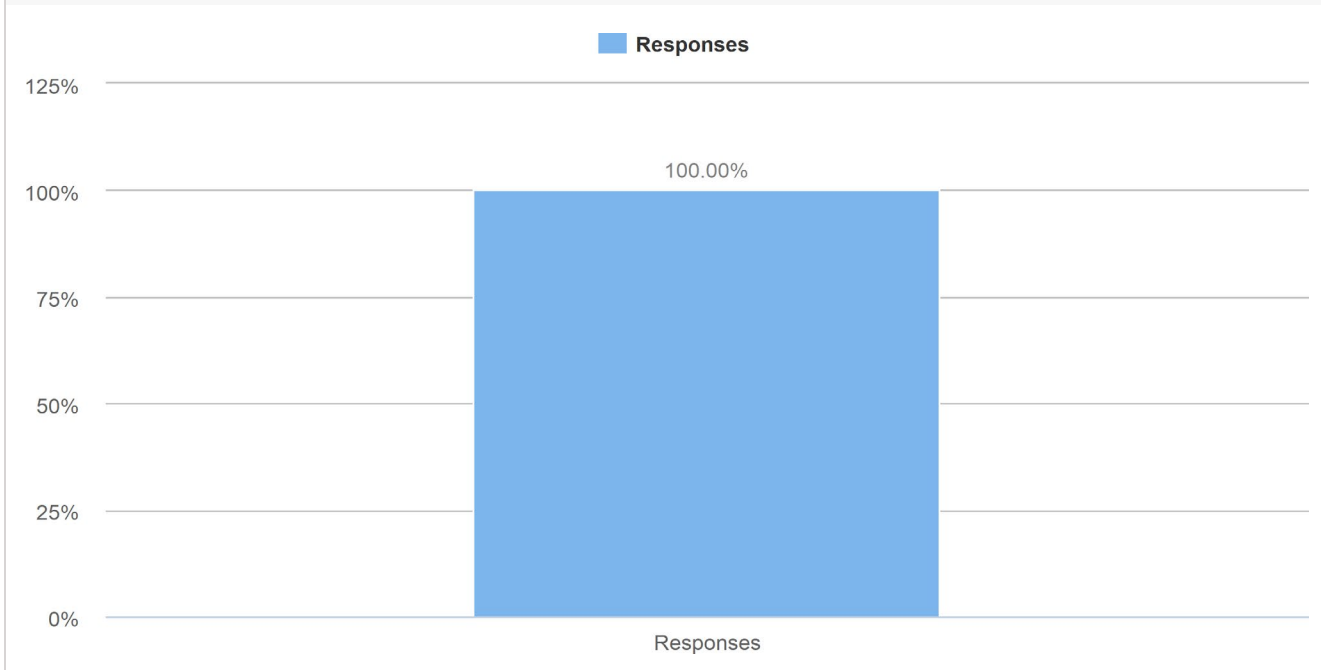
Question 5. How familiar are you with programs and services offered by nonprofit funded by the City of Denton to support affordable housing, public services, and community improvements?

Question 6. Do you have any suggestions on how the City of Denton could better engage with residents on community development activities?

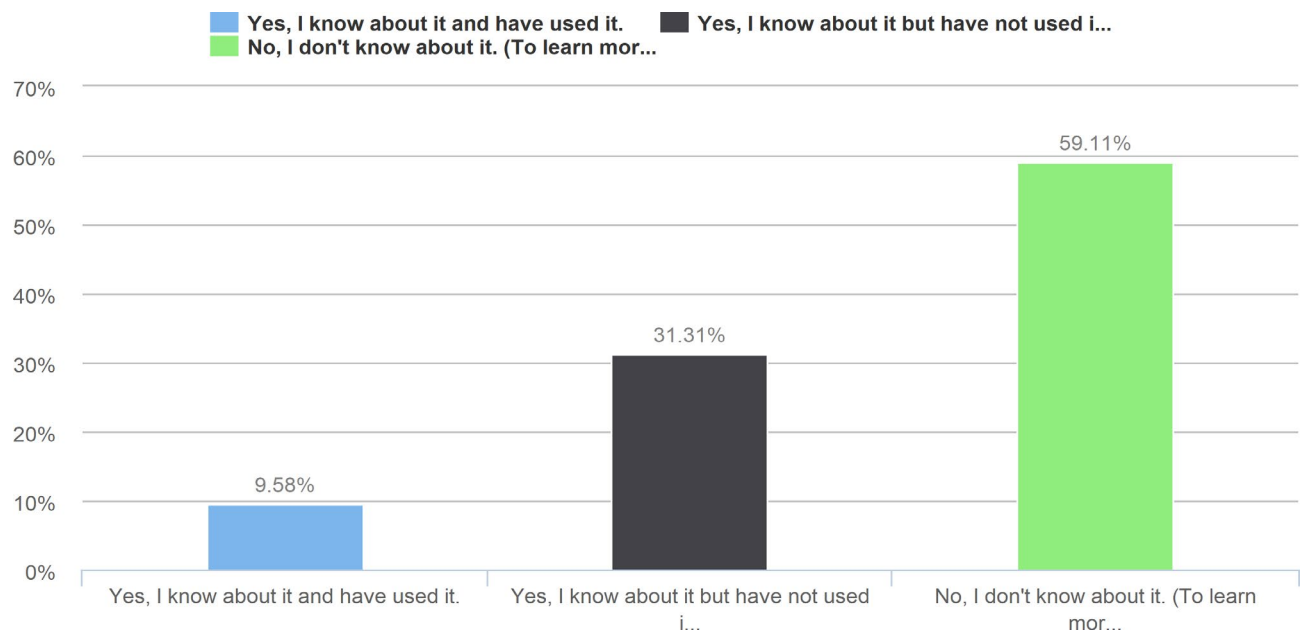

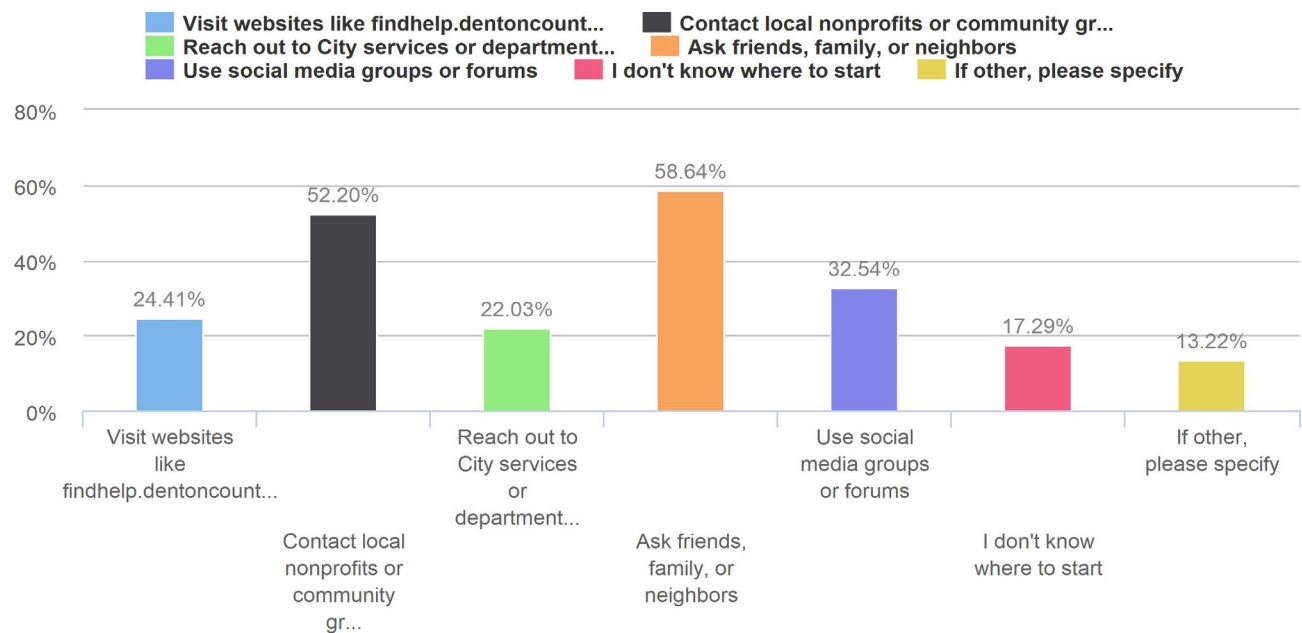
Question 7. Do you know about FindHelp Denton County (findhelp.dentoncounty.gov), a free website to find local help for things like housing, food, and healthcare?

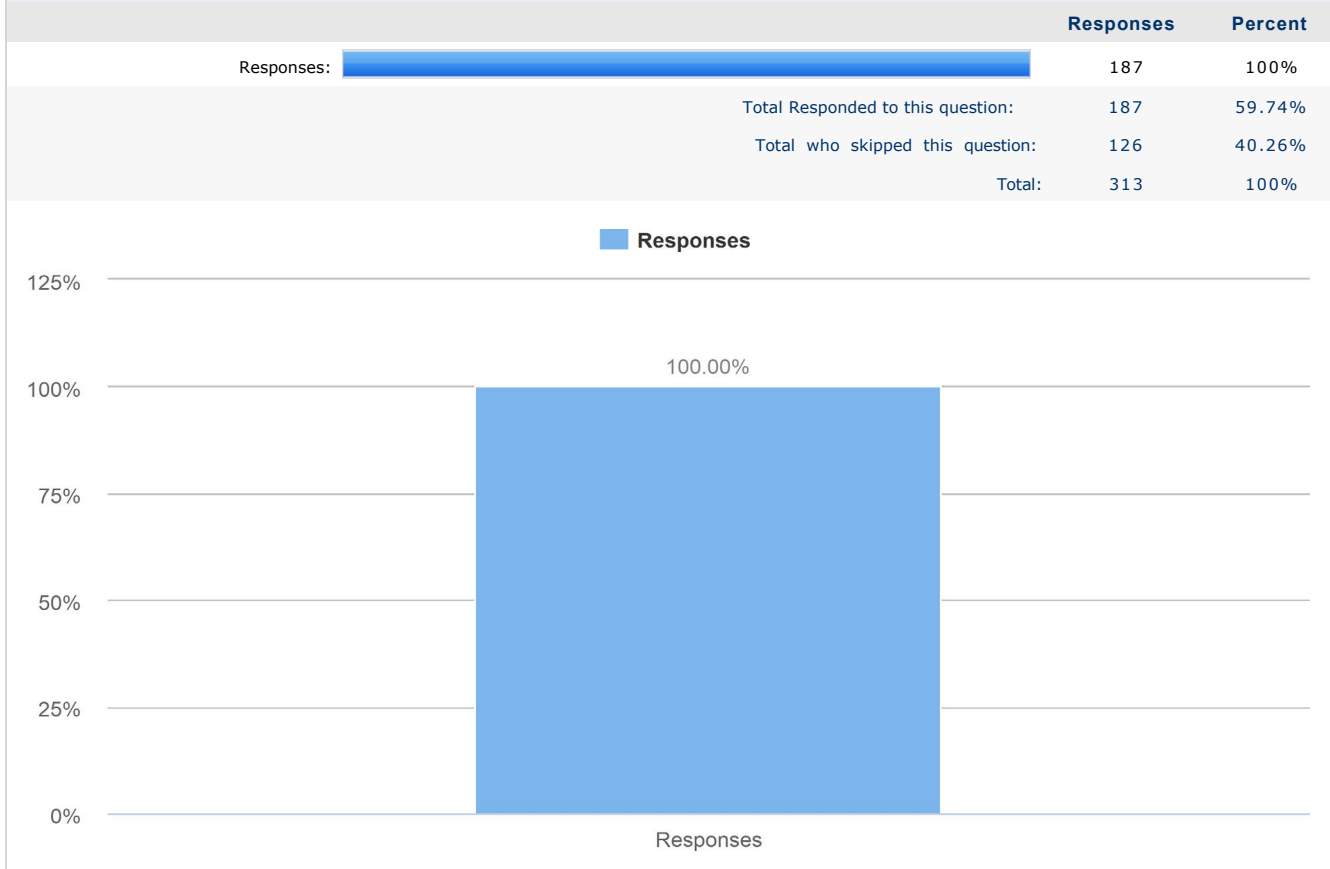
Question 8. If you or someone you know needs help with housing, food, healthcare, or other services, how do you usually get help (Select all that apply)

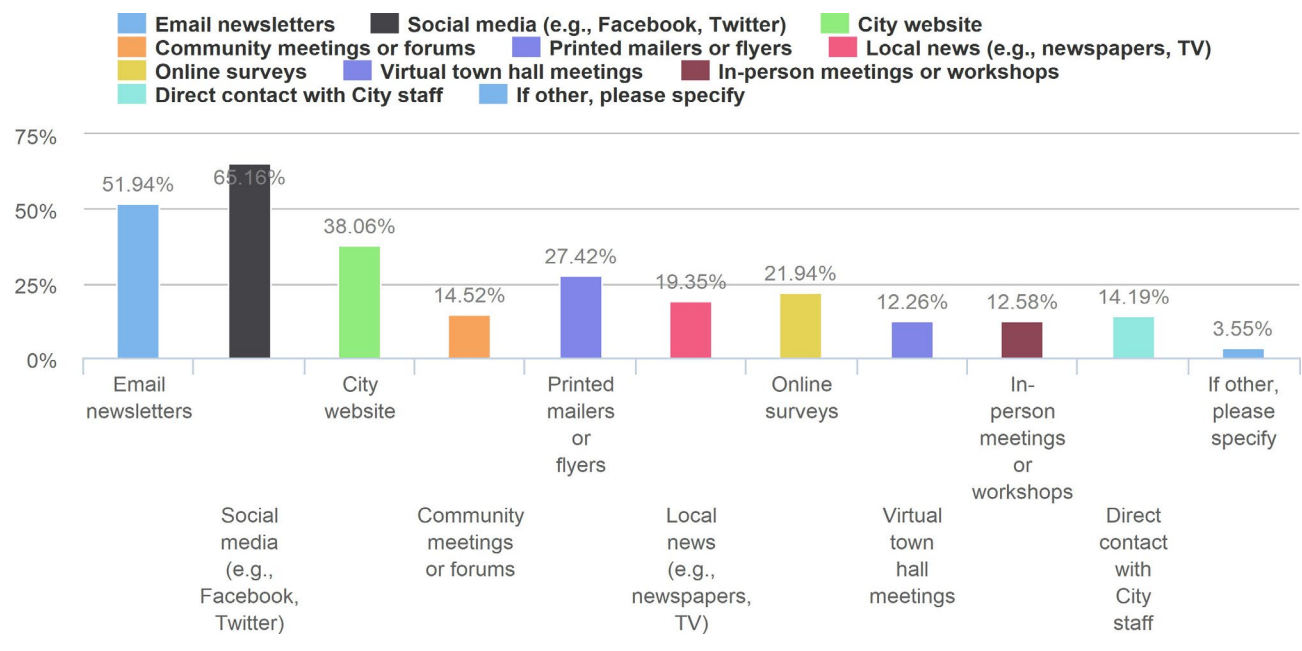
Question 9. What can the City of Denton do to help residents find and get the help they need more easily? (For example, more advertising, simple websites, in-person events, etc.)

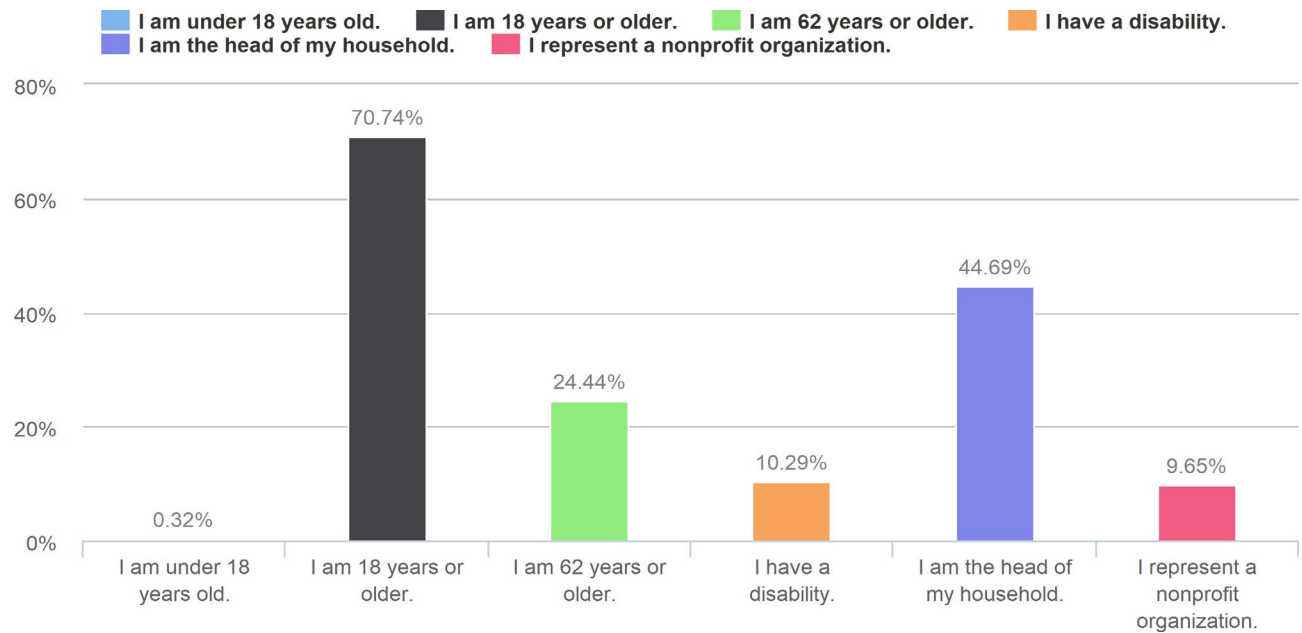

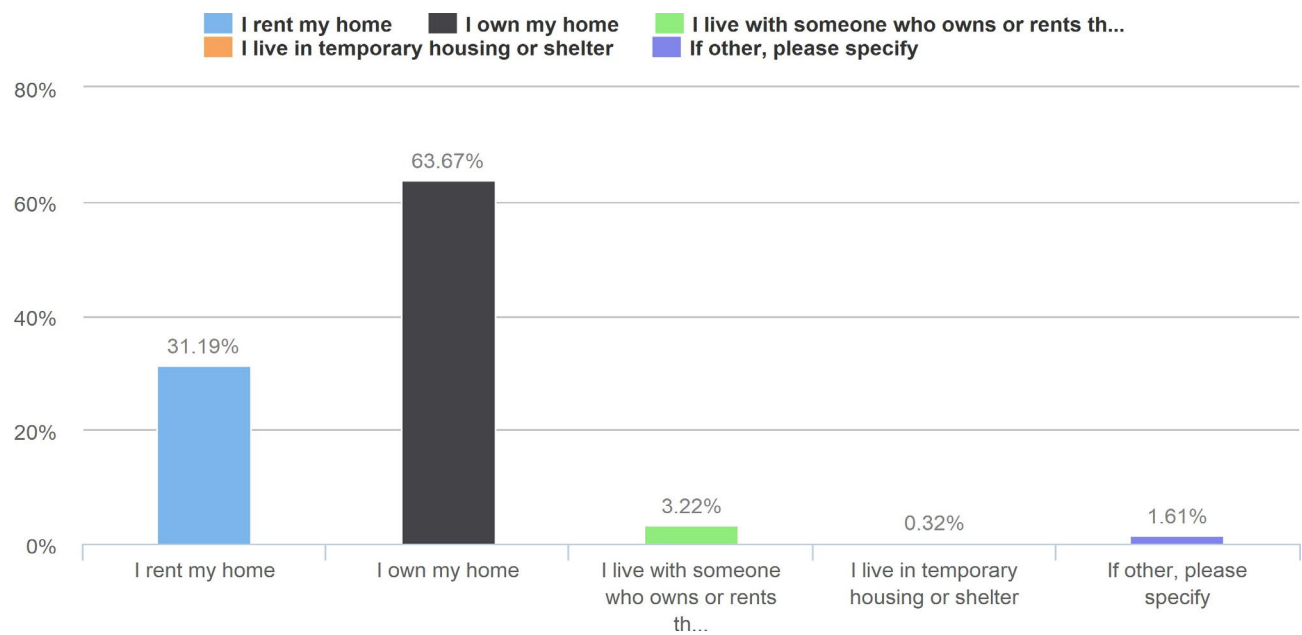
