SUBJECT

Hold a public hearing pursuant to the requirements of Chapter 26 of the Texas Parks and Wildlife code, that (1) there are no feasible and prudent alternatives to the change in use of approximately 9.4 acres of City park land, located within South Lakes Park in the City of Denton, Denton County, Texas, from a park to a public school for the construction of Denton Independent School District recreation facilities and (2) finding that all reasonable planning has been done to minimize harm to the land as a park; and providing an effective date. (Parks, Recreation and Beautification Board recommends approval with a vote of (5-0)).

BACKGROUND

Over the past few years, the City of Denton Parks and Recreation Department has been in ongoing discussions regarding the potential development of a neighborhood park on 3.433 acres of land at the former Calhoun Middle School site. This location has been identified as a high-priority area in the Parks and Recreation Land Plan due to its underserved status and growing community needs.

In a related initiative, the Denton Independent School District (DISD) proposed a land exchange involving 9.4 acres within South Lakes Park, which includes the existing track facility currently leased to DISD for school use. This proposal aligns with DISD's broader infrastructure goals, as reflected in the \$1.4 billion bond referendum approved on May 26, 2023. Among the projects funded by the bond is the renovation of the track adjacent to McMath Middle School, further supporting the district's commitment to enhancing educational and recreational facilities.

Since 1998, DISD has utilized this 9+ acres of South Lakes Park for student recreation space. DISD has built and maintained this area of the park since the construction of McMath Middle School.

State law as defined in Chapter 26, Protection of Public Parks and Recreational Lands, of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Code requires that:

- (a) a municipality of this state may not approve any program or project that requires the use or taking of any public land designated and used prior to the arrangement of the program or project as a park unless the municipality, acting through its duly authorized governing body or officer, determines that:
 - (1) there is no feasible and prudent alternative to the use or taking of such land; and
 - (2) The program or project includes all reasonable planning to minimize harm to the land, as a park, resulting from the use or taking.
- (b) A finding may be made only after notice and a hearing as required by this chapter."

Postcards were sent out to all residents within 500' of all properties under discussion, promotion on social media and a post on Nextdoor.

RECOMMENDATION

After evaluating all available options, staff recommend proceeding with the proposed land exchange. This action is not expected to significantly affect current operations or programming at South Lakes Park. In contrast, acquiring the additional acreage near the former Calhoun Middle School site will enhance neighborhood access to park space and help meet the area's identified recreational needs.

PRIOR ACTION/REVIEW

On October 6, 2025, the Parks, Recreation, and Beautification Board reviewed and recommended approval by a vote of (5-0).

FISCAL INFORMATION

Following a comprehensive review of all alternatives, staff recommend moving forward with the proposed land exchange. This action will not result in any significant disruption to existing operations or programming at South Lakes Park. Moreover, the acquisition of land near the former Calhoun Middle School site will expand park access for nearby residents and help address a critical need identified in the Parks and Recreation Land Plan.

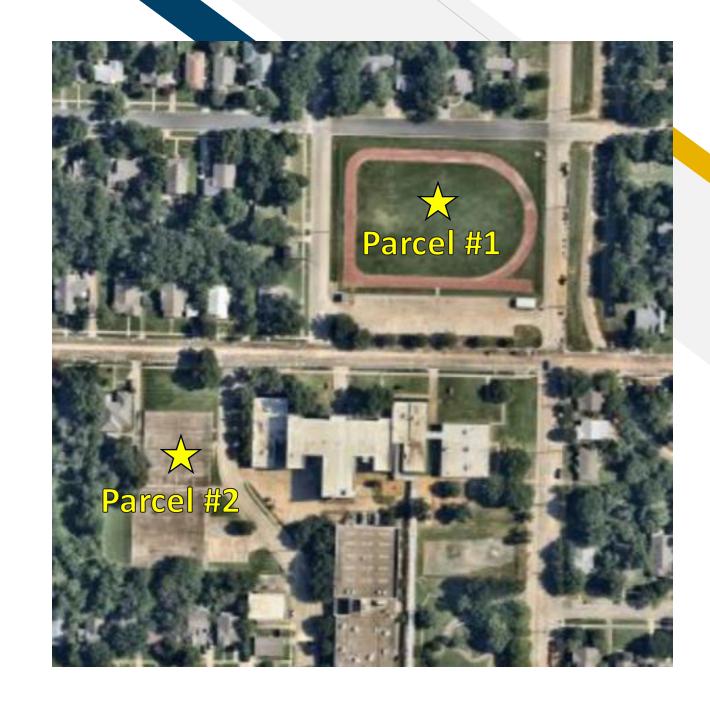

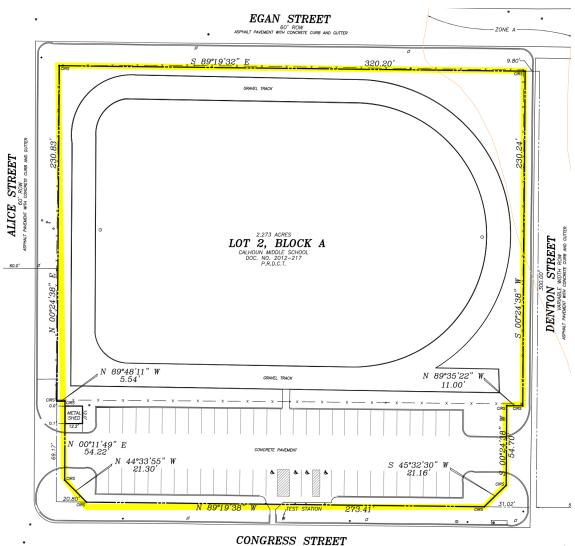

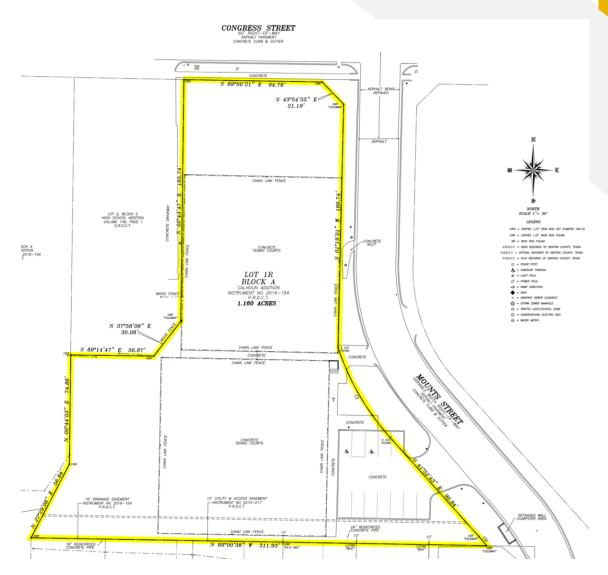

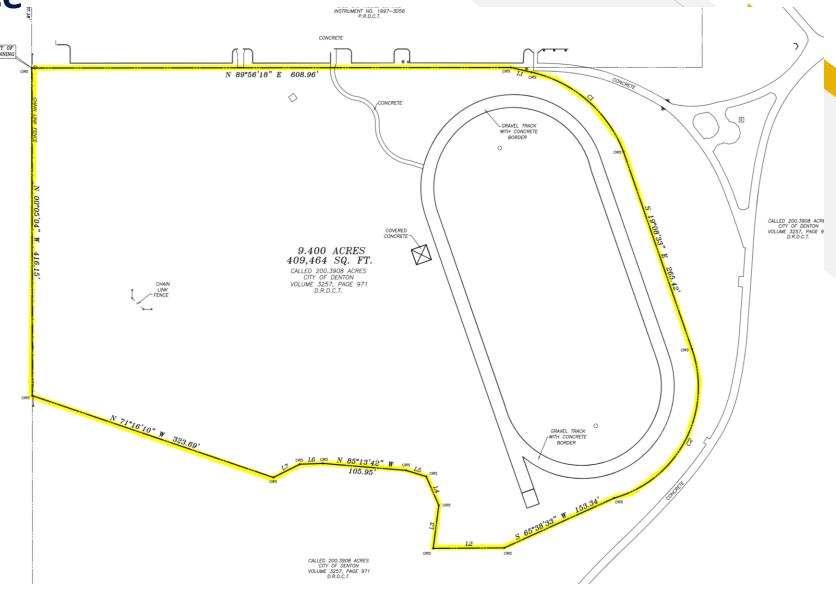

Chapter 26 Land Exchange

Current conditions -

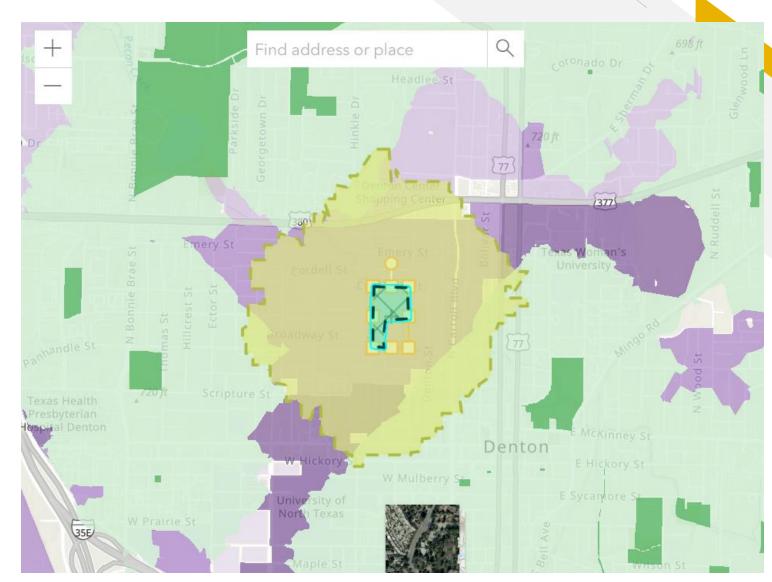
- DISD does not have enough land to build a track and open space for student recreation
 - Therefore, DISD has built, maintained, and leased 9+ acres in South Lakes Park for McMath Middle School recreational pursuits since 1998
 - Public can utilize the leased space outside of school operating hours
 - DISD has approved bond funding to improve the track and field turf

Proposed conditions –

- There is no feasible and prudent alternative to the use or taking land
 - Proximity of 9+ acres of land that is adjacent to McMath Middle School
 - Convenient for students
 - Would not require busing students to an off-campus location
 - Does not require purchase of additional land by DISD
 - DISD does not have any undeveloped land on campus to build a new track and field space
 - DISD will provide limited access to the track and field turf
 - Track will be available for rent to the public, but trails still provide fitness and accessibility for the community
 - Accessibility to open space will remain the same as the current lease
- Harm to land would be nonexistent as recreational facilities are being enhanced and improved

Value to Denton Park System

- High impact to Trust for Public Land, 10-Minute Walk Initiative
- This area is identified in the PARD Land Plan
- Increases access by 2.1% (57.4% to 59.5%)
- Adds a total of 3,210 residents within 10-Minute walk to a park



Benefits to City

- ✓ Provides immediate access to an inaccessible property for the public to utilize
- ✓ Future opportunity to provide an improved park space near the former middle school when funding is identified
- ✓ Access to open green space at South Lakes Park will remain unchanged

ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF DENTON MAKING A FINDING, PURSUANT TO THE REQUIREMENTS OF CHAPTER 26 OF THE TEXAS PARKS AND WILDLIFE CODE, THAT (1) THERE ARE NO FEASIBLE AND PRUDENT ALTERNATIVES TO THE CHANGE IN USE OF APPROXIMATELY 9.4 ACRES OF CITY PARK LAND, LOCATED WITHIN SOUTH LAKES PARK IN THE CITY OF DENTON, DENTON COUNTY, TEXAS, FROM A PARK TO A PUBLIC SCHOOL FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF DENTON INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT RECREATION FACILITIES AND (2) FINDING THAT ALL REASONABLE PLANNING HAS BEEN DONE TO MINIMIZE HARM TO THE LAND AS A PARK; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Chapter 26 of the Texas Parks of Wildlife Code provides that a municipality may not approve of any program or project that requires the use or taking of any public land designated and used as a park unless the municipality determines and finds that, after notice and hearing, 1) there is no feasible and prudent alternative to the use or taking of such land for the proposed project and 2) the program or project includes all reasonable planning to minimize harm to the park resulting from such use or taking; and

WHEREAS The City is the owner of 184.43 acres of land situated at 556 Hobson Ln, Denton, TX 76205 the description of which is set forth on Exhibit "A" hereto attached (the "City Tract"); and

WHEREAS, the City Tract currently operates as South Lakes Park and Recreation Facility, which is operated as public land designated for park and recreational area uses and is protected land under Chapter 26 of the Texas Park and Wildlife Code with 9.4 acres of such park being used by Denton Independent School District as recreation facilities for McMath Middle School; and

WHEREAS, Denton Independent School District ("DISD") is the owner of 3.433 acres of land and building located at 1900 Jason Dr, Denton Texas 76205, the description of which is set forth on Exhibit "B" hereto attached (the "DISD Tract"); and

WHEREAS, City and DISD are governmental entities with the power of eminent domain; and

WHEREAS, on May 6, 2023, DISD voters approved a \$1.4 billion bond referendum which provides funding for the construction of recreation facilities at McMath Middle School; and

WHEREAS, based on the approved funding, DISD has conducted a study of potential sites within this attendance zone, and determined, based on community needs and extensive public input, that maintaining and improving the existing running track and green space at McMath Middle School will best serve the citizens of Denton in providing a lower cost alternative for construction of the improved recreation facilities and maintain existing access for students and community; and

WHEREAS, based on DISD review of potential sites for recreation facilities, DISD has identified the City Tract as the best solution and location for the new facilities; and

- WHEREAS, DISD has requested to exchange approximately 9.4 acres of the City Tract for approximately 3.433 acres of the DISD Tract to accommodate the rebuilding of recreation facilities at McMath Middle School ("DISD Project")
- **WHEREAS,** City has requested to exchange approximately 3.433 acres of the DISD Tract for approximately 9.4 acres of the City Tract to accommodate the future development of a neighborhood park ("City Project" and collectively with the DISD Project the "Project"); and
- WHEREAS, the City of Denton City Council finds that it is in the public's best interest to approve the exchange for the overall enhancement of recreational access of the parcels for the community and gain a future neighborhood park without materially changing the current use of South Lakes Parks and Recreation Facility; and
- WHEREAS, Chapter 26 of the Parks and Wildlife Code requires that anytime a public park is put to a use other than public park use, the governing body must make a finding, after notice and a public hearing, that there is no feasible and prudent alternative to the proposed change in use; and
- **WHEREAS**, the City hosted community input meetings on September 25, 2025, and October 9, 2025, for the proposed property exchange; and
- WHEREAS, the City provided notice in the Denton Record-Chronicle on September 20, 2025, September 27, 2025, October 4, 2025, and October 11, 2025 of a Public Hearing to be held on October 21, 2025 at a Joint meeting of the Denton Independent School District and City Council at the Denton Development Services Center to consider the park exchange between Denton Independent School District; and
- WHEREAS, on October 21, 2025, the Denton Independent School District and City Council received testimony at a public hearing on the issues of feasible and prudent alternatives to the exchange of the park for the Project and that the Project includes all reasonable planning to minimize harm to the park resulting from the exchange; and
- WHEREAS, the City Council find that there are no feasible and prudent alternatives to the non-park use or taking of the park and the park land exchange includes all reasonable planning to minimize harm to the park as a result of the Project; NOW, THEREFORE,

THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DENTON HEREBY ORDAINS:

- <u>SECTION 1</u>. That the findings set forth in the recitals of this ordinance are found true and correct and are hereby adopted as the findings of the City Council.
- SECTION 2. In accordance with Chapter 26, Texas Parks and Wildlife Code, the City Council finds that: (i) the DISD Project requires the use or taking of the 9.4 acres of the City Tract; (ii) there is no feasible and prudent alternative to the change in use of approximately 9.4 acres of City park land located within the City Tract from a public park use to public school use; (iii) and that the proposed land exchange with DISD includes all reasonable planning to minimize harm to the land, as a park, resulting from the public school use.

<u>SECTION 3</u>. The rights and benefits set forth in this ordinance may not be assigned without the express written consent of the City.

 $\underline{\text{SECTION 4}}.$ This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage and approval.

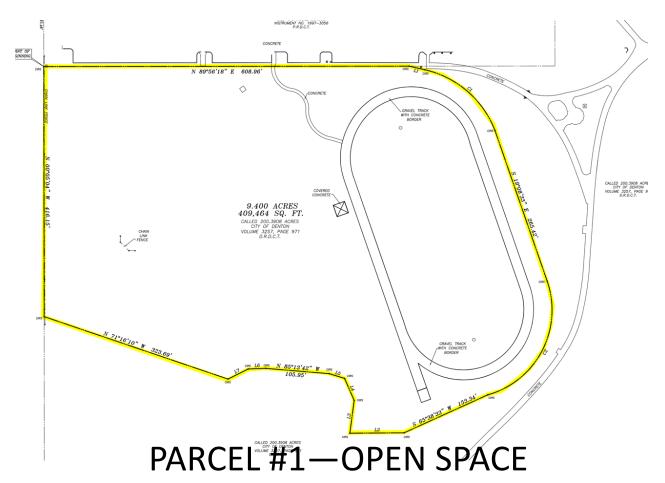

TITLE 3. PARKS

CHAPTER 26. PROTECTION OF PUBLIC PARKS AND RECREATIONAL LANDS

Sec. 26.001. PROTECTED LAND; NOTICE OF TAKING. (a) A department, agency, political subdivision, county, or municipality of this state may not approve any program or project that requires the use or taking of any public land designated and used prior to the arrangement of the program or project as a park, recreation area, scientific area, wildlife refuge, or historic site, unless the department, agency, political subdivision, county, or municipality, acting through its duly authorized governing body or officer, determines that:

- (1) there is no feasible and prudent alternative to the use or taking of such land; and
- (2) the program or project includes all reasonable planning to minimize harm to the land, as a park, recreation area, scientific area, wildlife refuge, or historic site, resulting from the use or taking.
- (b) A finding required by Subsection (a) of this section may be made only after notice and a hearing as required by this chapter.
- (c) The governing body or officer shall consider clearly enunciated local preferences, and the provisions of this chapter do not constitute a mandatory prohibition against the use of the area if the findings are made that justify the approval of a program or project.

Sec. 26.002. NOTICE OF HEARING. (a) When any program or project requires notice and a public hearing before approval, the notice must be given in writing to the person, organization, department, or agency that has supervision of the land proposed to be used or taken.

- (b) The notice must state clearly the proposed program or project and the date and place for the public hearing. The notice must be given at least 30 days before the date for the public hearing.
- (c) Notice must also be given to the public by publishing a notice similar to that specified in this section once a week for three consecutive weeks. The last days of publication must not be less than one week or more than two weeks before the date of the hearing. The notice must be published in a newspaper of general circulation, which paper must be published at least six days a week in the county where the land proposed to be used or taken is situated.
- (d) If there is no newspaper that qualifies under Subsection (c) of this section, the notice must be published in a qualifying newspaper that is published in any county adjoining the county where the land is situated. If there is no qualifying newspaper published in any adjoining county, then the notice must be published in a qualifying newspaper published in the nearest county to the county where the land is situated. If there is no qualifying daily newspaper published therein, the notice must be published in any newspaper of general circulation published in the political subdivision affected. If no newspaper is published in the political subdivision, the notice must be published in a newspaper published in the political subdivision nearest the political subdivision affected.

Added by Acts 1983, 68th Leg., p. 1035, ch. 235, art. 6, Sec. 2(a), eff. Sept. 1, 1983.

Sec. 26.003. LIMITATIONS ON JUDICIAL REVIEW. A petition for the judicial review of the approval or disapproval of a program or project under this chapter must be filed within 30 days after the approval or disapproval is announced, or the review is barred.

Added by Acts 1983, 68th Leg., p. 1035, ch. 235, art. 6, Sec. 2(a), eff. Sept. 1, 1983.

- Sec. 26.004. EXCLUDED LANDS. A department, agency, board, or political subdivision having control of the public land is not required to comply with this chapter if:
- (1) the land is originally obtained and designated for another public use and is temporarily used as a park, recreation area, or

wildlife refuge pending its use for the originally designated purpose;

- (2) the program or project that requires the use or taking of the land being used temporarily as a park, recreation area, or wildlife refuge is the same program or project for which the land was originally obtained and designated; and
- (3) the land has not been designated by the department, agency, political subdivision, county, or municipality for use as a park, recreation area, or wildlife refuge before September 1, 1975.

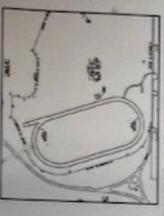

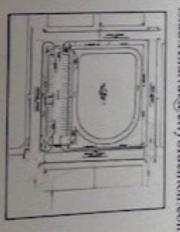

City of Denton Parks & Recreation LAND AQUISITION FOR THE 10-MINUTE WALK STRATEGY

"The Trust for Public Land, the National Recreation and Park Association, and the Urban Land Institute are leading a nationwide movement to ensure there is a park within a 10-minute walk of every person, in every neighborhood, in every city across America.

ADOPTION OF A 10-MINUTE WALK GOAL

The Trust for Public Land (TPL), the National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA), and the Urban Land Institute (ULI) are leading a nationwide movement to ensure there is a park within a 10-minute walk (1/2 mile) of every person, in every neighborhood, in every city across America. Over three hundred communities have come together to support the 10-Minute Walk to a Park Campaign to increase equitable park access and quality through local policy changes, master planning efforts, and increased funding. On February 26, 2019, City Council adopted the 10-Minute Walk to a Park Campaign, and former Mayor Watts signed the "Campaign Commitment".

Parks provide and support the physical, social, environmental, mental, and economic health of communities and cities nationwide. One in three Americans do not have access to park land within a 10-minute walk (or half-mile) of their home. As of August 2023, according to The Trust for Public Land, Park Serve database (www.parkserve.org), 58% of Denton residents (82,325 people) have a park or trail within a 10-minute walk of where they live. This means that approximately 58,925 Denton residents do not have a park or trail within walking distance of their home. While this is an 18% increase from when the program launched in 2017, the U.S. national average of people with similar access to a park space within a 10-minute walk from their home is 55%.

The City of Denton Parks and Recreation Department has adopted the "10-Minute Walk" initiative as our goal to provide safe access to parks and open spaces and to help in identifying where public park spaces should be. This measuring tool is used when identifying current and future needs in the planning process of park land development. This initiative serves as the city's baseline standard when visioning updated the Parks, Recreation and Trails System Master Plan, which was approved in 2022.

Parks and Recreation has developed a strategy to work towards achieving 100% park accessibility within Denton. This is an aspirational goal as 100% access may not be fully achievable in some areas of the city due to barriers that exists such as zoning, railroads, interstates, and waterways.

This document highlights the implementation strategy created by Parks and Recreation to achieve this Goal.



CITY-WIDE PLANNING

Denton 2040 Comprehensive Plan

Denton's natural environment is an essential element of the City that is important to the community as a whole. Environmental stewardship and sustainability is fundamentally tied to regional and global goals, which impact the quality of life of Denton residents and the health of the region. It is necessary for a plan of this scale to incorporate policies that address open space and natural resource protection into all land use decisions. As such, city staff has developed a framework of environmental policies that positively impacts the built environment and city functions, which supports the overarching vision for the Parks, Recreation and Trail System Master Plan.

As the population grows and land development expands over the time horizon of the Denton 2040 Plan, providing parks and open space and the conservation of natural resources is essential for maintaining the quality of life and character of Denton. The policies that follow address the provision of new parks and open space resources and resource conservation policies, which address the primary considerations of acquisition and are integrated into goals throughout the Comprehensive Plan. The policies are as follows:

- Create an integrated green infrastructure network that links parks and natural resources together through parks, trails, contiguous open space, and natural systems.
- Coordinate with regional partners to accomplish shared goals for holistic open space and recreation planning with ecosystem-wide conservation strategies.
- Provide of a variety of park types with adequate acreage to match population growth with varied community contexts.
- Create parks and recreational facilities and open spaces that incorporate elements of Denton's natural environment and preserve distinct environmentally-sensitive areas throughout the community.
- Prioritize strategies that integrate conservation objectives including protecting air quality, conserving ecosystems and habitat, protecting water bodies and water quality, conserving watersheds, and protecting the rural and agricultural character, where appropriate.
- Create an overarching vision to implement Denton's sustainability plan: Simply Sustainable: A Strategic Plan for Denton's Future (2020), including proactive policies for green building and solid waste recovery.
- Establish a robust system of parks, open space and recreational resources with a balance of park land uses that are vital for creating and sustaining memorable, livable neighborhoods and places to work.

DEPARTMENT PLANNING

<u>Denton Parks, Recreation and Trails System Master Plan</u>

The residents of Denton have shown that the parks, recreation, and trails system is extremely important to them through their continued support and involvement in the planning process. Their continued use of Denton's facilities show that maintaining and improving the system is necessary to preserve their quality of life. City residents understand that continued growth means an increased demand on the existing recreation system. How residents participate in recreational activities is also changing as user preferences evolve, new amenities are introduced, or unforeseen circumstances change user behaviors, such as the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Parks, Recreation and Trails System Master Plan provides recommendations for system improvements ahat are prioritized based on quantitative and qualitative data. The needs Assessment used a three part approach to determine future and current parks needs in Denton.

Standards Based Approach

The Standards Based Approach compares current and future population figures to acreage of parks within the City. With this analysis, access to and distribution of parks is also mapped throughout the City to identify gaps in park coverage. This approach compares the City facilities to national standards established by the National Recreation and Parks Association (NRPA). and in the future.

Demand Based Approach

The Demand Based Approach analyzes public input and facility use statics to determine what facilities are most used within the City and what residents most desire. This analysis was completed through online surveys, public meetings, focus groups, and an assessment of facility usage data.

Resource Based Approach

The Resource Based Approach identifies current amenities and assesses potential locations for future park amenities. These opportunities typically include creating additional preserves for natural systems, taking advantage of underused land in floodplains, collaborating with schools and other local entities to identify parkland for possible multi-use agreements, repurposing vacant open spaces, and identifying future development areas.

Each of these three approaches provides important information regarding the current and possible future configuration of the parks system, but only when taken together to do they provide a complete picture of park system needs. The assessment and recommendations resulting from these analyses help the Parks and Recreation Department determine what types of recreation facilities, amenities, and parks are needed in Denton. Denton residents provided their input in the needs assessment process during public meetings and through online surveys. By including resident insight, the Needs Assessment clarifies which parkland, recreational facility, and trail needs the city should address now and in the future.

As information is gathered from the community through formal and informal methods, staff works to match the needs and desires with potential land requirements while also considered 10-Minute Walk goals. This overarching strategy provides staff the insight to help build the park system for today and in the future.

PROPERTY ASSESSMENT

While assessing potential park properties, many factor need to be consider. These key identifiers include, but are not limited to:

- 10-Minute Walk
- Cost of the land
- Location of the parcel within the city
- Connectability to other parcels of interest
- Characteristics of the property
- Historical significance
- Topography
- Expansion of existing city property
- Tree canopy
- Ability to preserve open space
- Land designation of upland or floodplain
- Connectivity to nature

Once considerations have been reviewed by staff, the team can begin the process of acquisition as determined. The Parks, Recreation and Trails System Master Plan outlines the goal for land acquisition in the matrix below. Land acquisition is a metric that is tracked and monitored by the City.

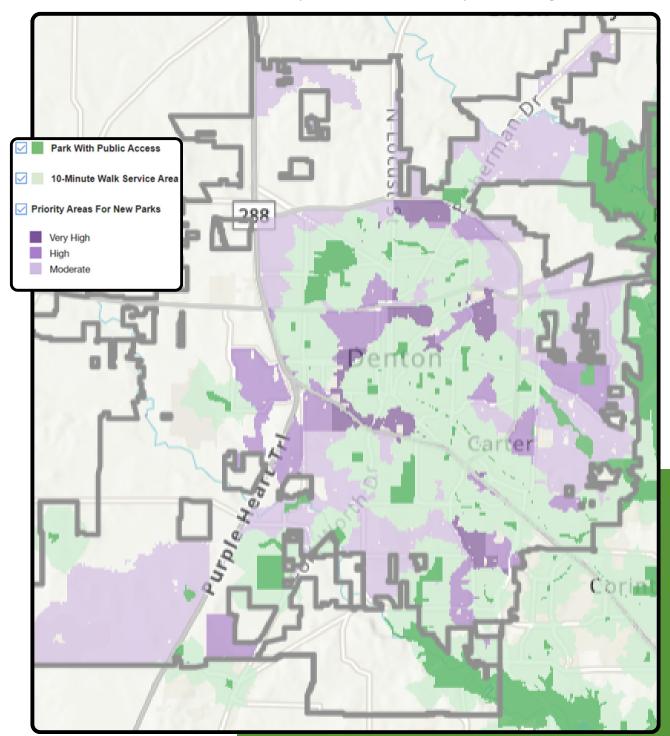

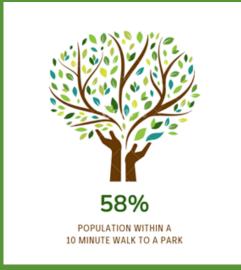

DEVELOPMENT ORDINANCE

Parks and Recreation utilizes the park land dedication and development ordinance to assist in planning and building parks, trails and more with the assistance of local developments. Parcels listed below made be dedicated to the City or an access easement may occur pending on the desired outcome of staff at the time. While flood plain can be valuable to the park system, staff needs to be diligent in considering land adjacent to residential and commercial properties.

- Biddy Bye Park Developer will construct Phase 1 during infrastructure development
- Eagle Creek Park (Under development as of August 2023)
- Townsend Property 11.56 acres (Acquired in September 2023)
- Kings Row 5-6 acres
- Deerwood / Silverdome Property 3-4 acres
- Northpointe Trail / Hercules to Discovery Park Acreage to be determined
- Cyrene (Development Agreement executed)
- Legends Ranch Approximately 100 acres of floodplain to be dedicated in phases that would be added to the Hickory Creek Trail (consider easement or acquisition)
- Denton 195 130 acres east of I-35 and south of Corbin (Pending)
- Canopy Trails 80 acres part of the Pecan Creek Trail. Project currently stalled, developer is selling off parcels. Staff stays in contact with the developer.
- Stella Property Located along Pecan Creek Trail and will combine with the Townsend Property to form a neighborhood park.
- Hickory Creek area 25 acres







LEASE

A lease should be negotiated with entities when possible that provides a long-term solution at a reduced cost of purchasing the land.

- Hartlee Field Property (Wastewater Property)
 - Administration from Utilities has provided the ability to use over 200 acres of the parcel for public use.
 Some space is needed for a future treatment plant asset. (Acquired)
- Pecan Creek Property Over 220 acres of land north and east of the Pecan Creek Treatment facility and landfill along Pecan Creek. (Acquired)
- Texas Parks and Wildlife As the City of Denton leases land from the United State Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), the city then subleases a portion of this land to the Texas Parks and Wildlife (TPWD) for the operation of the Greenbelt and parks around the perimeter of Lake Ray Roberts State Park.

PARK LAND IN THE CITY

Parks and Recreation has leased land from other city departments that was underutilized to use for park space.

EASEMENT

An easement is an affordable option to PARD as it provides public access without the need to purchase land while still providing rights to the land holders.

- Utility easements in cooperation with Denton Municipal Electric, Sewer, Water and TMPA for trail development throughout the city.
- Denton County Property An easement is needed to provide a concrete trail to connect Carl Young Sr. Park to Woodrow Park as part of the Pecan Creek Trail. (Staff has been working with Denton County for a few years.
- Hunter Ranch Parks and Trails Property to be owned, but built and maintained by the development but the City will have an access easement placed over all trails and park spaces.
- Cole Ranch Parks and Trails Property to be owned, built and maintained by the development but the City will have an access easement placed over all trails and park spaces.
- Cedar Street Park Attained an access easement to existing greenspace to serve as a public park space (Acquired).
- Hills of Denton Trail A trail from FM428 west to Bonnie Brae, just north of Long Road. A donation or dedication is being pursued:
 - Stuart Ridge, Beaver Creek and Stark Farms trails
- Kings Row easement A trail from FM428 southeast to Mingo (Acquired).
- Atmos Gas Pecan Creek Trail easement.
- Stella Property Access easement located along Pecan Creek Trail and will combine with the Townsend Property to form a neighborhood park/ trail.
- DenTex Access easement to combine property with Sagebrook Park.





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CONSERVATION EASEMENT

A Conservation Easement is a designated land area, that which had an exercise of rights otherwise held by a landowner for conservation purposes. It is an interest in real property established by an agreement between a landowner and municipality. This form of land preservation provides the landowners a financial savings via state and federal taxes while still using the land for a purpose that is consistent with partnering agency. As with other real property interests, the granting of a conservation easement is recorded in the local land records and becomes a part of the chain of title for the property. The conservation easement could impact resale value as it is maintained with the current and any future property owners.

- Hunter Ranch Pilot Knob A conservation easement was acquired in cooperation with Hunter Ranch in 2020.
- Silver Dome Property This parcel would preserve a large cropping of Post Oak trees to be preserved in perpetuity.
- Consideration should be considered on each parcel attained through the development process whether an access easement would be satisfactory over city ownership.

TEXAS LAND TRUST

Conservation easements remain with land despite a transition in ownership. This ensures a landowner's wishes are upheld into perpetuity, and the conservation value of working land is preserved.

PURCHASE

Today with a prospering economy, land is raising in price and being utilized for residential and commercial development. It is important that PARD identifies land opportunities today for future residents before land becomes too costly to purchase for parks and recreational facilities.

In addition, attainment of the Parks, Recreation and Trails System Master Plan (2022) goal of acquiring 1,850 acres of future open space would be accomplished. Based on the assumptions below, it is projected that the City of Denton would purchase between 705 and 1,255 acres of land for future park space. By acquiring this land, the City would substantially complete its goal of the 10-Minute Walk.

- East Lake Park Mills property (Acquired)
- Clear Creek Natural Heritage Center Davidson property (Acquired)
- Laney Lakes Park (Acquired)
- South Denton Property 46 acres (Under Negotiations)
- Northeast Property 6 acres
- Hercules Church 3 acres (Under Negotiations)
- Hills of Denton Need a future city/neighborhood parks (100+ acres) in this area.
- ETJ1 and ETJ2 Begin to explore property in the ETJ1 and ETJ2 for future open space preservation. As a new TXDOT road is planned that will run east and west, seek to acquired land for future generations while still affordable. (200-600 acres)
- Clear Creek Land to complete a visioned Clear Creek Trail that could be both on the north and south sides of the creek. Land on the north side of Clear Creek could be purchased to preserve the floodplain and future public access. Development in the upland may have to occur in order for some of this land to be considered for sale. (50-100 acres)
- Carter Property / Historic Airport Hangers and Runway Purchase land to preserve the hangers and runway for public access and programming. (50 acres)
- Carter Property North Acquire land on the north side of the Carter Property in the floodplain that can be used for open space, trails and preservation farming. (250 acres)
- Miscellaneous lots for neighborhood parks and beautification nodes (50-75 acres)
- South Denton property adjacent to an existing parcel that would preserve a large grove of trees (70+/- acres)

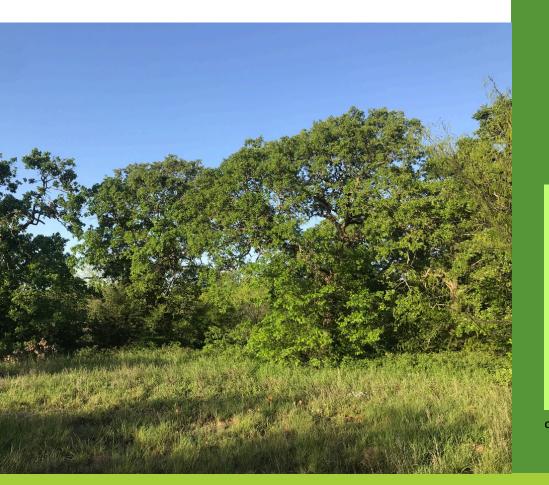
DONATION

Whenever feasible, it is preferred to development partnerships in which land can be donated to Parks & Recreation. This will allow resources to be focused directly on park development and maintenance.

- Rayzor Property near the Airport This small parcel, 3.79 acres has been added to the airport property. (Acquired)
- Welch Property 55+ acres (Pending TXDOT ROW acquisition)

GIFT OF LAND

Land can be donated to the City as a benefit to the property owner. This land dedication could consider naming opportunities as part of the park naming ordinance.





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CONNECTABILITY VIA CITY PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

Trails will be planned, designed, and constructed at various times based on Capital improvement funding availability. Some of these trails already have right-of-way while others will require more planning efforts. The thoroughfares provide a significantly easier way to connect parks proactively once land has been developed.

INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF DENTON, TEXAS, AND DENTON INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT FOR THE JOINT USE OF SELECT FACILITIES AND TRANSPORTATION SERVICES.

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into by and between the City of Denton, a Texas home rule municipal corporation (hereinafter "City") and Denton Independent School District (hereinafter "DISD"), a duly organized political subdivision of the State of Texas engaged in providing services to the citizens of Denton, Texas, each acting by, though, and under the authority of their respective governing bodies and officials. DISD and the City are referred to individually as "Party" and are collectively referred to herein as "Parties." This Agreement is for the purpose of:

1. Providing for the Joint use of:

- a. McMath Middle School Gold & Blue Gymnasium & Cafeteria (DISD owned facility)
- b. Borman Elementary School Gymnasium & Cafeteria (DISD owned facility)
- c. Strickland Middle School Small Gymnasium & Cafeteria (DISD owned facility)
- d. Evers Elementary School Gymnasium & Cafeteria (DISD owned facility)
- e. Newton Rayzor Elementary School Gymnasium & Cafeteria (DISD owned facility)
- f. Calhoun Middle School small and large Gymnasium, Cafeteria, Track, and Turf field (DISD owned facility)
- g. South Lakes Park Football, Track, Tennis Courts, and Softball Fields (COD owned facility)
- h. Any other DISD owned facility that may be requested by the City or substituted through coordination with DISD should the need arise.

2. DISD Transportation services for City Summer Camp programs

WHEREAS, DISD and the City are mutually interested in an adequate program of educational and leisure-related activities which can best serve the citizens of Denton; and

WHEREAS, the Parties have agreed that this Agreement would serve a public benefit and be beneficial to carry out the performance of governmental functions for the promotion and protection of the health and welfare of citizens within the Denton community, and full cooperation between the City and DISD is necessary to achieve the best service; and

NOW THEREFORE, the Parties, for the mutual consideration stated herein, agree and understand, as follows:

All matters and recitations stated in the preamble to this Agreement are true and correct and are hereby incorporated by reference into the provisions of this Agreement for all purposes.

In consideration for the joint use of facilities, DISD and City agree as follows:

Access

- 1. For each Denton ISD facility, Denton ISD will provide a set of keys to the City for access to the agreed upon areas. And where able, Denton ISD will provide an office and storage room for use by the City.
- 2. During the school year, City will have access to the McMath MS Gold Gymnasium outside of regular school time hours except during scheduled school events and programs. Additional schools/facilities may be requested through coordination with DISD and will be provided by DISD when requested by City subject to availability.
- 3. City agrees to provide adequate staff that must have completed a criminal background check, in accordance with City and DISD policy, and picture identification badges to supervise the conduct of program patrons at all times during City activities, and to make reasonable efforts to stop or prevent disruptive, ill-mannered or destructive behavior by patrons in Denton ISD facilities. However, this supervision shall <u>not</u> constitute an indemnification of damages caused by third party patrons, nor shall it be construed as a contractual obligation to responsibility for claims by DISD or third parties arising out of an alleged failure of the City to reasonably supervise.

The Parties shall cooperate with one another to prevent ill-mannered or destructive behavior from occurring on either Party's property by providing, upon request, to the other party any known names and addresses of those who participated in destructive behavior and taking reasonable action at the time of the occurrence of the incident to prevent the activity from occurring or reoccurring.

- 4. DISD will provide the City with a list of primary contacts for the supervisor for each facility. The City will provide each Denton ISD facility contact a list and criminal background checks of all employees scheduled to work in the facility. City employees will sign in and out at the front desk, or other appropriate locale, noting the City employee's name, time of entry and time of exit during school hours. City will ensure all employees maintain picture identification badges that work in the facility and will be required to wear the identification badges in a manner that the badges are visible to all at all times the employee is on DISD property.
- 5. DISD is authorized to utilize the football field, softball diamond, tennis courts and track in South Lakes Park, adjacent to the McMath building. DISD agrees to provide staff to supervise the conduct of students during school activities, and to make reasonable efforts to stop or prevent disruptive, ill-mannered or destructive behavior by students. However, this supervision shall <u>not</u> constitute an indemnification of damages caused by third parties, nor shall it be construed as a contractual obligation to assume responsibility for claims arising out of an alleged failure of the DISD to reasonably supervise. City will have access to these outdoor facilities when there are no regularly scheduled school activities. The tennis courts will be available for unstructured use after school hours. The school district

will maintain the athletic fields and the area on the east side of the campus down to the vegetation line of the creek.

Scheduling

- 6. DISD will provide on an annual basis, a schedule of school-sponsored activities and maintenance occurring in each facility which would conflict with the City hours of operation in the facility. In the event that a regularly programmed space is unavailable for scheduled City activities, DISD, within reason, will make a comparable and equivalent substitute facility available.
- 7. The City will provide on a quarterly basis to each facility contact, a schedule of City programs and activities occurring in each facility.
- 8. The Parties will provide 30 days' notice of any substantial changes to their schedule. The Parties will make every effort not to disrupt scheduled activities of either party.

Cost Increases

12. Costs increases beginning with the 2026 renewal term will be based on the Consumer Price Index for transportation and staffing costs but shall in no year included in the five (5) year term exceed 3 percent (3%).

Campus Adjustments and Additional Expenditures

13. The City may modify or add additional facilities when needed. Additional schools/facilities may be requested through coordination with DISD and will be provided by DISD when requested by City subject to availability. Any adjustments in the use of DISD facilities and additional expenditures shall not exceed the total amount authorized by Council.

Equipment

14. The City will provide its own sports equipment, which will be stored in the designated storage room. School-owned equipment will be provided upon prior request, including, but not limited to, volleyball standards, scoreboard controls, basketball raising and lowering mechanism and bleacher control devices. City shall be responsible for any damage caused by City staff to DISD equipment provided to the City.

Signage

15. With permission from the DISD supervisor of the facility, the City shall be allowed to use brochure racks or bulletin boards to display information on Parks and Recreation's activities. The City will be allowed to display additional informational signage, as long as the City uses materials approved by DISD prior to placement of the signage.

Maintenance

- 16. DISD will provide adequate clean-up of school sponsored activities in DISD facilities and restrooms, which includes removing trash, sweeping and mopping floors and restocking paper supplies in the restrooms prior to City use. The City, at its sole cost, will on each day in which the City has used the facilities, provide trash bags and remove trash from the facility and restrooms, sweep the facility, and shall mop the floors each week at the end of the day Saturday.
- 17. City staff shall report any broken items and equipment or maintenance concerns to the facility supervisor immediately.

Warranties

18. The facilities, including all portions thereof and all equipment provided by either Party for use, are provided "As Is." Neither Party makes any representations, warranties, or guarantees, express or implied, including, without limitation, the warranty of merchantability and the warranty of fitness for a particular purpose, relating to the facilities or to either Party's use thereof.

Each party agrees to be responsible for any damages caused by the party's direct use of the other's Party's facilities or equipment, less depreciation. However, this responsibility shall not extend to damages caused in whole or in part by ordinary wear.

Consideration

19. DISD City enter into this agreement on consideration of the mutual promises and duties set forth herein, and upon the right to jointly use facilities owned by each. By execution of this agreement, the parties stipulate to the to the adequacy of consideration therefor.

Liability and Immunity

20. This Agreement is not intended to extend the liability of the parties beyond that provided by law. Neither City nor DISD waives, nor shall be deemed hereby to waive, any immunity or defense that would otherwise be available to it against claims arising by third parties. The parties to this Agreement agree that the exchanges and permitted uses described in this Agreement constitute payments in amounts that fairly compensate the other party for the services and functions performed under this Agreement.

In the performance of their respective duties hereunder, the Parties hereto and their respective employees and agents, are at all times acting and performing as independent contractors of each other. No Party will have the authority to act for or bind another Party in any respect or to incur or assume any obligation or liability, or responsibility on behalf of or in the name of another Party hereto. DISD agrees and understands that DISD, its employees, servants, agents, and representatives shall at no time represent themselves to be employees, servants, agents, and/or representatives of the City. The City agrees and understands that the City, its employees, servants, agents, and representatives shall at no time represent themselves to be employees, servants, agents, or representatives of DISD.

DISD shall be responsible for the acts, negligence, and/or omissions of all DISD, its employees, agents, subcontractors, and/or contract laborers and for all other persons doing work under a contract or agreement with the DISD.

The City shall be responsible for the acts, negligence, and/or omissions of all City employees, agents, subcontractors, and/or contract laborers and for all other persons doing work under a contract or agreement with the City.

Term and Termination

21. The initial terms of this Agreement is from the date of execution until December 31, 2025. Thereafter, the agreement shall automatically renew for successive one-year periods, for five (5) years, unless terminated by delivering written notice of non-renewal at least sixty (60) days prior to the end of that term. Notice shall be effective upon actual receipt (or upon posting of certified mail), if directed to the attention of the following individuals:

INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF DENTON, TEXAS AND DENTON INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT FOR THE JOINT USE OF THE MCMATH MIDDLE SCHOOL GOLD GYM AND FOR USE OF THE SOUTH LAKES PARK FOOTBALL, TRACK, TENNIS AND SOFTBALL FIELDS

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into by and between the City of Denton, a Texas home rule municipal corporation (hereinafter "City") and Denton Independent School District (hereinafter "DISD"), a duly organized political subdivision of the State of Texas engaged in providing services to the citizens of Denton, Texas, each acting by, through, and under the authority of their respective governing bodies and officials. DISD and the City are referred to individually as "Party" and are collectively referred to herein as "Parties." This Agreement is for the purpose of providing for joint use of the McMath Middle School Gold Gym and for joint use of the South Lakes Park football, track, tennis, softball fields.

WHEREAS, the Parties have agreed that this Agreement would serve a public benefit and be beneficial to carry out the performance of governmental functions for the promotion and protection of the health and welfare of citizens within the Denton community, and full cooperation between the City and DISD is necessary to achieve the best service with the least possible expenditure of public funds; and

WHEREAS, the City's Parks and Recreation Department desires access to the McMath Middle School Gold Gym after school hours for activities and DISD desires use of the building site and adjacent football, track and softball fields at South Lakes Park.

NOW THEREFORE, the Parties, for the mutual consideration stated herein, agree and understand, as follows:

All matters and recitations stated in the preamble to this Agreement are true and correct and are hereby incorporated by reference into the provisions of this Agreement for all purposes.

Access

Denton ISD will provide an office and storage room for use by the City and will provide a set of keys for this area, as well as for a facility known to the parties at the time of formation as the "Gold gym" and the janitorial closet to perform required cleaning / maintenance. DISD will also retain a set of keys. City employees will also have access to the Gold gym office and storage room during all regular school operating hours. City employees must have identification badges to have access to the building.
- 2. City will have access to the Gold gym every evening between the hours of 6:00 p.m. and 10:15 p.m., except during scheduled school events and programs. Additionally, City will have access to the gym beginning thirty (30) minutes after the regular school day is over when there are no regularly scheduled activities, and on Saturdays between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m., and on Sundays between the hours of 12:00 p.m. and 10:00 p.m. and all other non-school days, unless a school activity has been previously scheduled. During the summer months, after school recesses concluding the spring semester, the City will have access to the gym between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m. weekdays. Weekend hours will remain the same. All activities will be concluded by 10:15 p.m., and the building will be cleaned and vacated by 10:45 p.m., whereupon the City will lock the gym upon departure with the keys provided.

City agrees to provide adequate staff that must have completed a criminal background check, in accordance with City and DISD policy, and picture identification badges to supervise the conduct of gymnasium patrons at all times during these activities, and to make reasonable efforts to stop or prevent disruptive, ill-mannered or destructive behavior by patrons in the gymnasium. However, this supervision shall <u>not</u> constitute an indemnification of damages caused by third party patrons, nor shall it be construed as a contractual obligation to assume responsibility for claims by DISD or third parties arising out of an alleged failure of the City to reasonably supervise.

The Parties shall cooperate with one another to prevent ill-mannered or destructive behavior from occurring on either Party's property by providing, upon request, to the other party any known names and addresses of those who participated in destructive behavior and taking reasonable action at the time of the occurrence of the incident to prevent the activity from occurring or reoccurring.

The City will provide the McMath Middle School Principal a list and criminal background checks of all employees scheduled to work in the facility once a month. City employees will sign in and out at the front desk, or other appropriate locale, noting the City employee's name, time of entry and time of exit during school hours. City will ensure all employees maintain picture identification badges that work in the facility, and will be required to wear the identification badges in a manner that the badges are visible to all at all times the employee is on DISD property. Might it be wise management for City Employees to <u>sign</u> out even when it is after regular school hours?

Scheduling

- 4. DISD will provide on an annual basis, a schedule of school-sponsored activities and maintenance occurring in the Gold gym which would conflict with the city hours of operation in the facility. In the event that the Gold gym is unavailable for scheduled City activities, DISD, within reason, will make comparable and equivalent substitute facilities available.
- The Parties will provide a 30 days' notice of any substantial changes to their schedule. The Parties will make every effort not to disrupt scheduled activities of either party.

Costs

6. All costs for utilities and regular custodial services will be absorbed by DISD, except as specifically provided otherwise herein. Should the City request custodial services, DISD will invoice \$25 per hour on a quarterly basis.

Equipment

7. The City will provide its own sports equipment, which will be stored in the designated storage room. School-owned equipment will be provided upon prior request, including, but not limited to, volleyball standards, scoreboard controls, basketball raising and lowering mechanism and bleacher control devices. City shall be responsible for any damage to DISD property provided to the City.

Signage

8. The City shall be allowed to use the brochure rack in the Gold gym to display information on Parks and Recreation's activities. The City will be allowed to display additional informational signage, as long as the City uses materials approved by DISD prior to placement of the signage.

Maintenance

9. DISD will provide adequate clean-up of school sponsored activities in the Gold gym and restrooms, which includes removing trash, sweeping and mopping floors and restocking paper supplies in the restrooms. The City, at its sole cost, will on each day in which the City has used the facilities provide trash bags and remove trash from the Gold gym and restrooms, and sweep the gym, and shall mop the floors of the Gold gym each week at the end of the day Saturday.

This letter is intended to serve as a interim letter of agreement regarding the relationship between the City of Denton and the Denton Independent School District concerning the use of McMath Middle School for the 1998-99 school year.

General

- The existing joint use agreement between the City of Denton and the Denton Independent School District will remain in place and covers general conditions on a city and district-wide basis. This letter of agreement specifically refers to the extended use of McMath Middle School.
- 2. This agreement will stay in effect for the 1998-99 school year. Either party will give 30 days notice if there is a substantial schedule revision.

Access

- 3. In the gold gym Denton I.S.D. has provided an office and storage room reserved exclusively for use by the City of Denton. The city will be provided a set of keys for these areas as well as the gold gym. The school district will also retain a set of keys. City of Denton employees will have access to the gold gym office and storage room during all regular school operating hours.
- 4. Access The City of Denton will have access to the gym every evening at approximately 6:00 p.m. except for the evenings when volleyball and basketball games are scheduled (see attached schedule). The city will have access to the gym immediately after school when there are no regularly scheduled activities. The city will have access on Saturdays, Sundays and all other non-school days unless a school activity has been previously scheduled. All activities will be concluded by 10:30 p.m.

- 5. City of Denton will provide a list of all employees scheduled to work in the facility. If possible, city employees will sign in and out at the front desk. The district will provide picture identification cards for city employees scheduled to work in the facility.
- 6. City of Denton may reserve other rooms, as available, in the building following guidelines in the joint use agreement.

Scheduling

7. Denton I.S.D. will provide, on an annual basis, a schedule of school-sponsored activities and maintenance occurring in the gold gym which would conflict with city hours of operation in the facility. Hours of operation for City of Denton activities are:

School Year Schedule

- 8. Both the Denton I.S.D. and City of Denton will provide 30 days notice of any substantial changes to either schedule. Both agencies will make every effort not to disrupt scheduled activities of the other agency.
- 9. Denton I.S.D. will schedule any maintenance (i.e. resurfacing of gym floors) to avoid any disruption of City of Denton programs.

Costs

10. The only costs charged to the city will be a \$21.50 fee for opening and closing the school on non-school days. All costs for utilities and regular custodial services will be absorbed by Denton I.S.D. The City of Denton will provide for telephone and computer services. The city will be responsible for any damages incurred during city-sponsored activities. Whenever possible, the district will schedule district custodial and security staff to coincide with opening and closing times requested by the city to avoid unnecessary charges. If any charges are required, the district will invoice the city quarterly for any charges related to opening and closing the building.

Equipment

11. The city will provide its own sports equipment, which will be stored in the designated store room. School-owned equipment may be available upon request including volleyball standards, scoreboard controls, public address system and bleacher control devices.

Outdoor Areas

12. The city will have access to the football and baseball fields when there are no regularly scheduled school activities. The tennis courts will be available for unstructured use after school hours. The school district will maintain the athletic fields and the area on the east side of the campus down to the creek.

SUBJECT

Consider adoption of an ordinance of the City of Denton making a finding, pursuant to the requirements of Chapter 26 of the Texas Parks and Wildlife code, that (1) there are no feasible and prudent alternatives to the change in use of approximately 9.4 acres of City park land, located within South Lakes Park in the City of Denton, Denton County, Texas, from a park to a public school for the construction of Denton Independent School District recreation facilities and (2) finding that all reasonable planning has been done to minimize harm to the land as a park; and providing an effective date. (The Parks, Recreation and Beautification Board recommends approval with a vote of (5-0))

BACKGROUND

Over the past few years, the City of Denton Parks and Recreation Department has been in ongoing discussions regarding the potential development of a neighborhood park on 3.433 acres of land at the former Calhoun Middle School site. This location has been identified as a high-priority area in the Parks and Recreation Land Plan due to its underserved status and growing community needs.

In a related initiative, the Denton Independent School District (DISD) proposed a land exchange involving 9.4 acres within South Lakes Park, which includes the existing track facility currently leased to DISD for school use. This proposal aligns with DISD's broader infrastructure goals, as reflected in the \$1.4 billion bond referendum approved on May 26, 2023. Among the projects funded by the bond is the renovation of the track adjacent to McMath Middle School, further supporting the district's commitment to enhancing educational and recreational facilities.

Since 1998, DISD has utilized this 9+ acres of South Lakes Park for student recreation space. DISD has built and maintained this area of the park since the construction of McMath Middle School.

State law as defined in Chapter 26, Protection of Public Parks and Recreational Lands, of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Code requires that:

- (a) a municipality of this state may not approve any program or project that requires the use or taking of any public land designated and used prior to the arrangement of the program or project as a park unless the municipality, acting through its duly authorized governing body or officer, determines that:
 - (1) there is no feasible and prudent alternative to the use or taking of such land; and
 - (2) The program or project includes all reasonable planning to minimize harm to the land, as a park, resulting from the use or taking.
- (b) A finding may be made only after notice and a hearing as required by this chapter."

Postcards were sent out to all residents within 500' of all properties under discussion, promotion on social media and a post on Nextdoor.

RECOMMENDATION

After evaluating all available options, staff recommends proceeding with the proposed land exchange. This action is not expected to significantly affect current operations or programming at South Lakes Park. In contrast, acquiring the additional acreage near the former Calhoun Middle School site will enhance neighborhood access to park space and help meet the area's identified recreational needs.

PRIOR ACTION/REVIEW

On October 6, 2025, the Parks, Recreation, and Beautification Board reviewed and recommended approval by a vote of (5-0).

FISCAL INFORMATION

Following a comprehensive review of all alternatives, staff recommend moving forward with the proposed land exchange. This action will not result in any significant disruption to existing operations or programming at South Lakes Park. Moreover, the acquisition of land near the former Calhoun Middle School site will expand park access for nearby residents and help address a critical need identified in the Parks and Recreation Land Plan.

ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF DENTON MAKING A FINDING, PURSUANT TO THE REQUIREMENTS OF CHAPTER 26 OF THE TEXAS PARKS AND WILDLIFE CODE, THAT (1) THERE ARE NO FEASIBLE AND PRUDENT ALTERNATIVES TO THE CHANGE IN USE OF APPROXIMATELY 9.4 ACRES OF CITY PARK LAND, LOCATED WITHIN SOUTH LAKES PARK IN THE CITY OF DENTON, DENTON COUNTY, TEXAS, FROM A PARK TO A PUBLIC SCHOOL FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF DENTON INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT RECREATION FACILITIES AND (2) FINDING THAT ALL REASONABLE PLANNING HAS BEEN DONE TO MINIMIZE HARM TO THE LAND AS A PARK; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Chapter 26 of the Texas Parks of Wildlife Code provides that a municipality may not approve of any program or project that requires the use or taking of any public land designated and used as a park unless the municipality determines and finds that, after notice and hearing, 1) there is no feasible and prudent alternative to the use or taking of such land for the proposed project and 2) the program or project includes all reasonable planning to minimize harm to the park resulting from such use or taking; and

WHEREAS The City is the owner of 184.43 acres of land situated at 556 Hobson Ln, Denton, TX 76205 the description of which is set forth on Exhibit "A" hereto attached (the "City Tract"); and

WHEREAS, the City Tract currently operates as South Lakes Park and Recreation Facility, which is operated as public land designated for park and recreational area uses and is protected land under Chapter 26 of the Texas Park and Wildlife Code with 9.4 acres of such park being used by Denton Independent School District as recreation facilities for McMath Middle School; and

WHEREAS, Denton Independent School District ("DISD") is the owner of 3.433 acres of land and building located at 1900 Jason Dr, Denton Texas 76205, the description of which is set forth on Exhibit "B" hereto attached (the "DISD Tract"); and

WHEREAS, City and DISD are governmental entities with the power of eminent domain; and

WHEREAS, on May 6, 2023, DISD voters approved a \$1.4 billion bond referendum which provides funding for the construction of recreation facilities at McMath Middle School; and

WHEREAS, based on the approved funding, DISD has conducted a study of potential sites within this attendance zone, and determined, based on community needs and extensive public input, that maintaining and improving the existing running track and green space at McMath Middle School will best serve the citizens of Denton in providing a lower cost alternative for construction of the improved recreation facilities and maintain existing access for students and community; and

WHEREAS, based on DISD review of potential sites for recreation facilities, DISD has identified the City Tract as the best solution and location for the new facilities; and

- WHEREAS, DISD has requested to exchange approximately 9.4 acres of the City Tract for approximately 3.433 acres of the DISD Tract to accommodate the rebuilding of recreation facilities at McMath Middle School ("DISD Project")
- **WHEREAS,** City has requested to exchange approximately 3.433 acres of the DISD Tract for approximately 9.4 acres of the City Tract to accommodate the future development of a neighborhood park ("City Project" and collectively with the DISD Project the "Project"); and
- WHEREAS, the City of Denton City Council finds that it is in the public's best interest to approve the exchange for the overall enhancement of recreational access of the parcels for the community and gain a future neighborhood park without materially changing the current use of South Lakes Parks and Recreation Facility; and
- WHEREAS, Chapter 26 of the Parks and Wildlife Code requires that anytime a public park is put to a use other than public park use, the governing body must make a finding, after notice and a public hearing, that there is no feasible and prudent alternative to the proposed change in use; and
- **WHEREAS**, the City hosted community input meetings on September 25, 2025, and October 9, 2025, for the proposed property exchange; and
- WHEREAS, the City provided notice in the Denton Record-Chronicle on September 20, 2025, September 27, 2025, October 4, 2025, and October 11, 2025 of a Public Hearing to be held on October 21, 2025 at a Joint meeting of the Denton Independent School District and City Council at the Denton Development Services Center to consider the park exchange between Denton Independent School District; and
- WHEREAS, on October 21, 2025, the Denton Independent School District and City Council received testimony at a public hearing on the issues of feasible and prudent alternatives to the exchange of the park for the Project and that the Project includes all reasonable planning to minimize harm to the park resulting from the exchange; and
- WHEREAS, the City Council find that there are no feasible and prudent alternatives to the non-park use or taking of the park and the park land exchange includes all reasonable planning to minimize harm to the park as a result of the Project; NOW, THEREFORE,

THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DENTON HEREBY ORDAINS:

- <u>SECTION 1</u>. That the findings set forth in the recitals of this ordinance are found true and correct and are hereby adopted as the findings of the City Council.
- SECTION 2. In accordance with Chapter 26, Texas Parks and Wildlife Code, the City Council finds that: (i) the DISD Project requires the use or taking of the 9.4 acres of the City Tract; (ii) there is no feasible and prudent alternative to the change in use of approximately 9.4 acres of City park land located within the City Tract from a public park use to public school use; (iii) and that the proposed land exchange with DISD includes all reasonable planning to minimize harm to the land, as a park, resulting from the public school use.

<u>SECTION 3</u>. The rights and benefits set forth in this ordinance may not be assigned without the express written consent of the City.

 $\underline{\text{SECTION 4}}.$ This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage and approval.

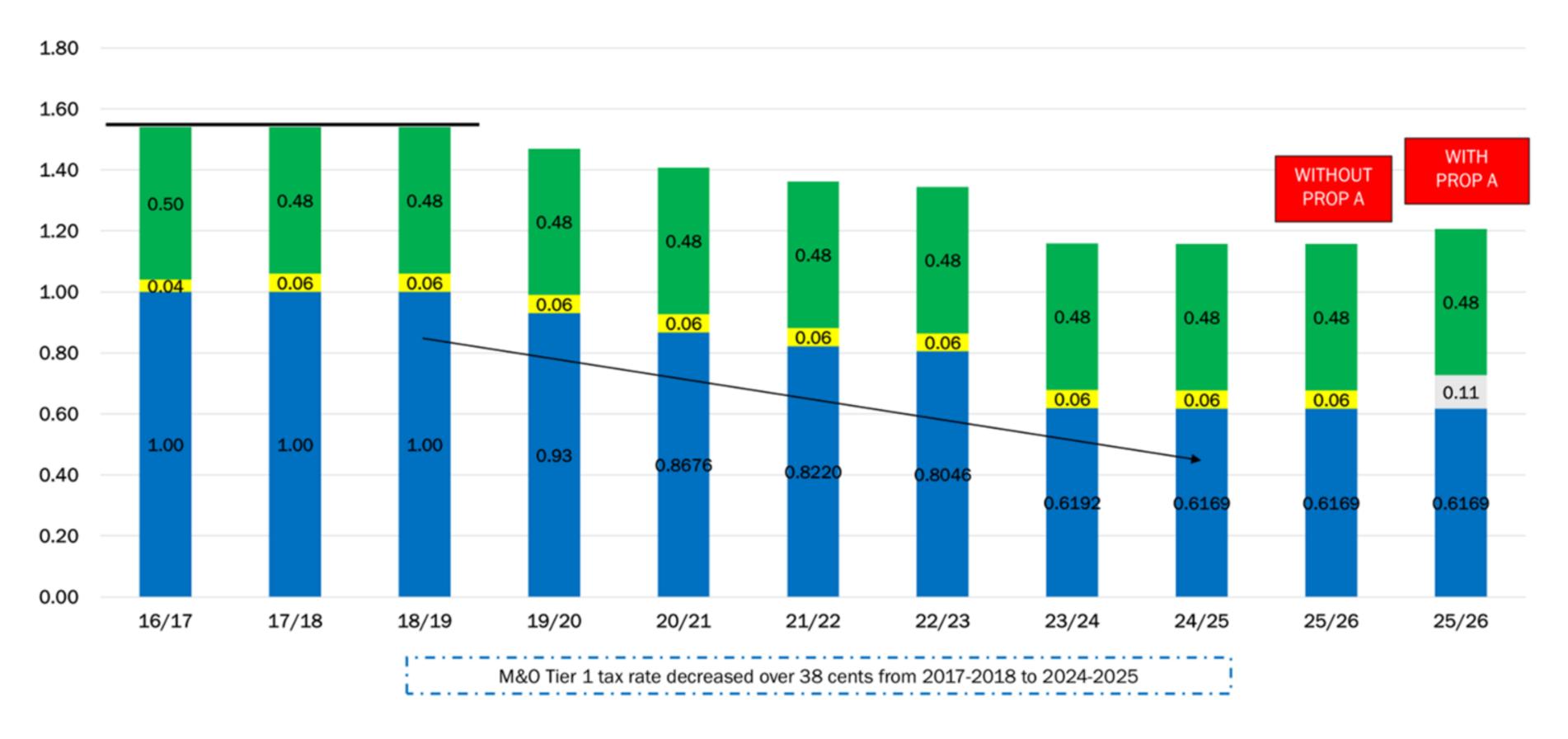
