


Current Trail System

- 74.5 Miles of Trails
- 45.7 Miles of Paved Trails
- 28.8 Miles of Soft Surface Trails
- 43 different park locations with trails

Challenges

- Keeping up with City growth
- High construction costs (\$1.8M 2M/mile)
- Competitive grant processes



Benefits of Trail System



Increases connectivity and accessibility throughout the City & safe routes to schools



Opportunity to connect with nature



Integrates with new roadways planning and development



Decreases vehicular traffic by providing alternative modes of transportation (non-motorized, pedestrian)



Promotes health & wellness



Creates opportunities for specialized trails- Wildlife Crossings, Off-Road Vehicle Trails, Equestrian trails



Economic driver and partnerships with development community

- Denton 2040 Plan (2022)




Meeting the Need

- Safe pedestrian crossings/walkways

- Park & hike/bike trailheads
- Lightning along trail
- Calisthenic equipment along trail
- Shade along trails
- Coordinate with local partners

Future Trails in Need of Development

- Pecan Creek Trail Master Plan Council Adopted (2023)
 - DCTA Rail Trail to Lewisville Lake
- Hickory Creek Trail Master Plan Current Project (2023)
 - Old Alton Bridge to US380
- Cooper Creek Trail Extension Future Project (2024)
 - Future Bonnie Brae Trail to Nicosia and Avondale Park east
- Powerline Easement Trails Future Project (2023)
 - FM428 to approximately Bonnie Brae (north of Loop 288)
- Lewisville Lake Paddling Trail Future Project (Pending TPWD Approval)
 - Partnership w/lake communities, TPWD and USACE, 100 miles in total
- Undeveloped Parkland Trail Implementation Future Projects
 - East Lake Park, Laney Lake Park, Southwest Park, etc...
- Existing Parks Trail Extensions Future Projects (2023/Ongoing)
 - Denia Park, Joe Skiles Park, Northpointe, Eagle Creek Park, Mountain Bike Trails, North Lakes Park





Summary

- 1. Parks and Recreation to continue to aggressively and strategically focus on grant acquisitions to expand and expedite the planning and construction of community trails
 - City required match for grants range from 15%-50%
 - Local, state, federal, non-profit could range from \$1,000 to millions
 - · Grant process is very-competitive, has long approval process, and specific project completion time frames
- 2. Key focus areas
 - · Planning and design
 - Multi-modal infrastructure
 - 10' wide trail with concrete, gravel or designated surface
 - Connectivity
 - · Connections with neighborhoods, business, schools, parks, downtown and more
 - Trail amenities
 - Trailheads, lighting, trees, landscaping, irrigation, park furnishings, and signage
- 3. Trail projects depending on grant award, may require phasing.
 - Pecan Creek Trail Master Plan Various phases
 - Hickory Creek Trail Master Plan Various phases
 - Cooper Creek Trail Extension Bonnie Brae east to existing Cooper Creek Trail
 - Powerline Easement Trails FM428 west to point to be determined
 - · Off-road trails



Proposed

\$15.0 Million Dollars for Trail Development

Parks and Recreation to continue to aggressively and strategically focus on grant acquisitions to expand and expedite the planning and construction of community trails

- Funding request for trail planning and construction
 - Pecan Creek Trail (11 miles at completion)
 - Cooper Creek Trail (1+ miles at completion)
 - Hickory Creek Trail (12-15 miles at completion)
 - Other trail amenities and connectivity opportunities

Estimated \$1.8M – 2.0M/mile (design and construction)
