BACKGROUND

Southwire Company, LLC is North America's leading manufacturer of wire and cable used in the distribution and transmission of electricity. The Company, headquartered in Carrollton, Georgia, is a family owned and founded in 1950. Nearly 1 in 2 homes made in the United States are produced with Southwire cables. The Company acquired United Copper Industries in 2016 and significantly increased the manufacturing capabilities and geographical footprint in the region. Today, Southwire's reputation for quality and service continues to grow, with more than 7,000 employees throughout the world.

Project

Southwire currently maintains a dedicated manufacturing campus located at 2727 Geesling Road in Denton, which primarily produces copper wire manufactured products. The Denton plant has been identified as a potential location for expansion, but the facility is in competition for capital with locations is several other states. The proposed project would modernize and expand Southwire's existing Denton operations by increasing the location's current manufacturing capacity to support future growth goals. Southwire seeks to install new equipment and infrastructure to support additional production lines that would ultimately increase copper wire production capacity by over 50 million pounds. In addition, Southwire would seek to install new equipment and infrastructure to support additional production lines in order to manufacture products such as aluminum wire, large copper building wire, and aluminum photovoltaic (PV) products. This expansion would require an addition of 100,000 square footage to the existing facility. The Company is leveraging \$85.4 million dollars over the next three years and anticipates an increase in valuation of over \$69 million in expansion and modernization efforts. A total of 95-net new jobs will be added at the campus in Denton.

Policy Considerations

The project addressed five of the priority considerations and four of the Public Benefit Factors detailed in the Incentive Evaluation Matrix (Exhibit 2). Highlights of the considerations and public benefits include:

- Engages is sustainable practices: Project has adopted sustainable or green business practices (e.g. LEED certification, renewable energy commitment or use, energy efficient construction);
- Creates knowledge-based jobs, as documented by the applicant (An average wage that is above the average wage in Denton County or at least 25 percent of jobs requiring a college bachelor's degree);
- Expands the tax base through property, sales, Hotel Occupancy Tax (HOT), or other taxes to the City, County, DISD, and DCTA through the development of property, facility or by making improvements to an existing property or facility, through the development of a new business or expansion of an existing business, through the development of a new multi-tenant complex where businesses can locate, or through the addition or increase in jobs available in the City; and
- Community Investment: company, or developer demonstrates a commitment to community support
 or involvement through monetary or in-kind support of local nonprofits, public institutions, or
 community organizations.

Project Benefits

Staff conducted analysis on the information provided by the company to ensure stated policy criteria were met and determine both qualitative and quantitative public benefits. Staff also used an economic impact analysis model to quantify the economic impact and rate of return. Total Impact, by Austin-based Impact DataSource, is a customized economic development modeling tool that performs economic and fiscal impact analysis and incentive analysis. The economic impact is based on a Regional Input-Output Modeling System (RIMS II) created by the U.S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis, which is widely used to estimate the direct and secondary impacts of an event on the regional economy using input and output methods.
